Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 4 .- Dr. Lung President Roosevelt's physician, this morning said that he anticipated no serious results to the President from yesterday's accident. The President will leave here tomorrow on the Sylph preparatory to starting from Washington on his short southern trip. He will leave Washington at 7:30 p. m. tomorrow on a special train for Chattanooga, where he will attend the annual convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen on Monday.

DRIVER PLATT. Pittsfield, Mass., Sept. 3. - A dispatch says that the driver of President Roosevelt's carriage, D. J. Pratt, was very badly hurt, and it was reported that he had died. His body was taken into the Stevens House, and it was found that Pratt was unconscious, but not dead. A few minutes later an ambulance from the Pittsfield hospital arrived, and he was delivered to

that institution. The crowd became greatly excited, and pouring into the street surrounded the wrecked carriage and the car, shouting at the motorman and conductor and creating a great disturbance. Almost immediately persons began snatching away the fragments of the carriage in which the President had ridden.
