**London and the Middlesexes.**

The redistribution committee has divided Middlesex into three ridings, which exactly correspond to the Provincial ridings. The only difference is that West London is detached from East Middlesex and incorporated with the city of London, of which it is municipally a part.

In North Middlesex, the township of Stepney and the town of Exeter are restored to Huron county, where they belong. The township of Adelaide is taken from West Middlesex and the township of Lobo from South Middlesex.

West Middlesex loses Euphemias, which is a part of London county, and takes in Carleton and Delaware townships, from South Middlesex.

The present riding of South Middlesex is extinguished.

South London, East London and West London will vote with the city proper for the first time in a Dominion election.

The Opposition will raise an objection to giving the county of Middlesex three members, on the ground that several counties with a larger population have only two. These counties, however, have suffered a loss of only one riding, while Middlesex would lose one-half its parliamentary contingent.

The unit of representation in Middlesex might be increased by leaving East London, South London and West London in the rural ridings, but it has been thought better to permit all citizens of London to vote together, even though the arrangement gives London only one member for 35,000, and the county one member for 18,000. The unit of representation as a general thing is larger in the cities. Toronto will get only one member for every 41,000 population.

The Conservatives of Middlesex should support Mr. Hyman in his effort to prevent the country being deprived of two ridings. The division is admittedly a fair one, following, as it does, municipal boundaries, and allowing every elector to vote in the same constituency for both Dominion and Provincial purposes.

**The Late Justice Armour.**

Justice Armour, who died in the old country today, was a great jurist—one of the greatest that has ever adorned the Canadian bench. He had reached the age of 73, but his stalwart appearance and his vigor of mind seemed to promise a long period of unimpeded activity. He appeared to be in the maturity of his powers when he was elevated to the Supreme Court last year. Only a few weeks ago he was signally honored by being appointed to the Alaska boundary tribunal. It was to undertake these duties that he went to London, England, although he was beset by the fatal malady before he left Canada. Justice Armour was a man of deeply marked characteristics. He had great natural abilities; his intellect had a peculiarly robust quality, tempered by strong common sense and a fearless candor, which did not hesitate to brush aside legal sophistries, quibbles and red-tape, to get at the vital realities of a case. The bar admired his pronounced personality and respected his judicial capacity.

Justice Armour was the son of the late Rev. Samuel Armour, and was born in the township of Otonabee, Peterborough county, in 1836. He attended the public school at Cayuga, Durham county, where his father was rector for many years, and entered Upper Canada College in 1852. He matriculated in 1857, and passed into King's College, now Toronto University, where he had a brilliant career, winning several scholarships and the gold medal in classics in his graduating year. In 1859 he entered the law office of his brother, Robert Armour, and was called to the bar in 1863. He entered into partnership with Hon. Sidney Smith, of Cobourg, but this was dissolved in 1867. He became crown attorney of the united counties of Northumberland and Durham in 1868; warden in 1869; Queen's Counsel in 1867; and a bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada in 1871. He was appointed a puisne judge of the Court of Queen's Bench in 1877.

Justice Armour's death makes the second vacancy in the Canadian Supreme Court within two months. It will be necessary also to appoint at once his successor on the boundary commission, and the Government will doubtless adhere to the terms of the treaty with the United States by naming "an impartial jurist of repute." It will be difficult to replace Justice Armour on either the Supreme Court bench or the Alaska tribunal.

**The Railway Bill.**

The railway bill, which has been progressing through the House of Commons for many weeks, has passed the committee stage. The bill represents a prodigious amount of labor and painstaking. It is a monument to Mr. Blair's energy and capacity, and he has been heartily congratulated by both sides of the House. Parliament was seen at its best during the discussion of this measure. The minister freely invited suggestions, and accepted a number of amendments from members of the Opposition. His desire seemed to be to make the bill as perfect as possible, and he cheerfully withdrew his own clauses when something better was offered him. Party lines were very seldom drawn. The House treated it as a business, not a party, question, and the Opposition must be given credit for its share of the work. The bill is a consolidation of the railway act, but the main interest centers in the creation of a board of railway commissioners, which will have sweeping jurisdiction over the railroads of the country. This legislation is fraught with very great importance to the whole country. There are many who are not sanguine as to the results, but the shippers and producers were unanimous in demanding it, and the existing machinery was wholly inadequate.

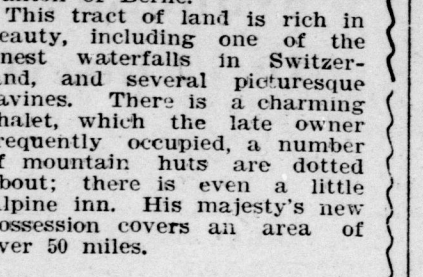

Jordan Harbor, Ont., July 11.—A young man named Vaughan Johnston, of Niagara Falls, Ont., was drowned in the bay at this place, swimming about 8 o'clock, directly in front of Jordan Harbor postoffice. He, in company with two other young men, was bathing. All three were unable to swim, and it is supposed that Johnston took a crank as after sinking he never rose. The water was not over seven feet deep. Owing to the excitement the location of the place where he sank was lost.

**First Wheat Transaction.**

Winnipeg, July 11.—The first transaction in wheat for September delivery this season took place yesterday, a considerable quantity of Manitoba No. 1 hard being contracted for at 77 cents. Price of spot wheat, which is necessarily at least a year's crop, was 82½ cents at the time the deal was made. The contract, of course, will be filled by wheat of the new crop.

**KINGSMILL'S**

Many Arrests Have Been Made by Russian Authorities.

Odessa, July 11.—Prince Trusoff, the new Governor of Bessarabia, has arrived at Kishineff, and taken up his official duties. M. Chaplin, official of the ministry of justice, and Judge Polian, vice-president of the district court of Odessa, are also at Kishineff, in connection with the inquiry that is being made into the Jewish massacre. The examining magistrates have completed their investigations and will prepare the indictment of the prisoners in a few days. The officials absolutely refuse to give any information concerning the number of prisoners, what the charges will be, and whether any of the accused will be capitally charged. The criminal courts of Russia are not empowered to inflict capital punishment under any circumstances. Capital charges are always remitted to a military tribunal. It is not believed that any death sentences will be imposed in connection with the massacre. The heaviest punishment provided by the law is a term of years' penal servitude or deportation.
