## THREE LONDON MEN KILLED IN AFRICA!

## Ptes. Huston, Peters and Evans Dead; John Gunn Severely Wounded.

### They Enlisted for South Africa beating heart and swelling breast to meet his fate. Last December.

Were Engaged in Monday's Great Battle at Hart's River.

The News Made Sunday a Day of Sadness-Huston and Gunn Had Many Friends Here.

Not since the sad news of how London's boys bravely fought and bled and died, on that fatal Sunday of Feb. 8, 1900, has the meaning of war come nearly home to the citizens of London as now, when word again comes away in January are sleeping in death on the lonely veldt of a South African battlefield. A dispatch received yesterday, at 4:30 p.m., and bulletined immediately by The Advertiser, brought the information that the list of casualties contained the names of three brave lads who went to the war from

London only three short months ago. With no conception of the stern realities of war, with their landlegs carcely found after their long sea voyage, and with no opportunity to acinured burghers and gallantly held their own against them and died like heroes for King and Empire.

## PTE. W. G. HUSTON.

Pte. W. G. Huston, one of the two London soldiers whose life was lost on the field, had been a resident of London for five years, having come here from St. Marys, where his widowed mother and two sisters are today mourning their loss. He was a tinsmith for the Acetylene Gas Company, and was greatly liked by his employers and his fellow-workmen. He was a charter member of the Manhattan Club, and was given a heartfelt farewell on the occasion of his leaving for the front. There was an element of romance in the circumstances under which Huston stepped into the ranks of the departing soldiers. Wm.
