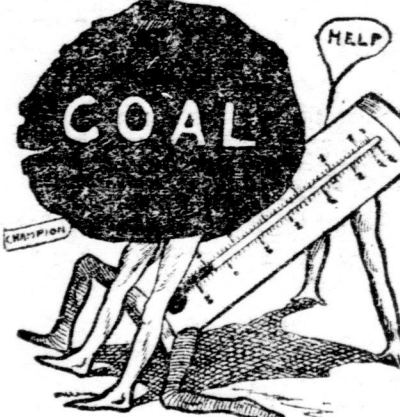

TWO MONTHS IN COOLER FOR M'GUIRE

Man Who Flimflammed Londoner in a Slick Coal Swindle.

William McGuire, the man who secured money from two women in this city about the first of the year by representing that he had received orders from their husbands for coal from a broken car, was sentenced to 20 days in the House of Correction yesterday by Judge Jeffries, of Detroit, and was also ordered to pay a fine of \$5 and \$5 costs.

McGuire completes his term there are a number of other charges pending against him.

Mrs. McGuire, a dashing blonde, asked for leniency for her husband. "You are charged with the larceny of only \$15 in this complaint, which is made by Mary Elliott," said Justice Jeffries, "but you have swindled many other women in the city, I believe. The sentence of the court is that you pay a fine of \$5, \$5 costs and be in addition imprisoned in the House of Correction for 20 days. This is the limit for this offense."

CAN TEMPER COPPER.

New York, Feb. 4.—Charles Ludlow, of Keenburgh, N. J., says he has discovered a process whereby copper can be refined, tempered and made useful as a cutting tool. Mr. Ludlow became interested in copper when the trolley road first went through Keenburgh, and for the last four years he has experimented with the metal. Judge John E. Foster is acting as Mr. Ludlow's representative in the matter. One New York concern has already offered \$54,000 for the discovery. Negotiations have been opened with the copper traders for the sale of the patent which has been applied for.
