

Principal McCutcheon reported that the attendance at the Collegiate In-The most important feature of the board of education meeting yesterday afternoon was the report of High School Inspector Spotton, in which he calls attention to the crowded condition of the Collegiate, and suggests that either the assembly room and the laboratories be turned into classrooms and a new laboratory built, or a technical school be established in the city Inspector Spotton pointed out that He suggested that some of the boys the school is seriously overcrowded at the present time, and that more achands be provided with lumber and ommodation is absolutely necessary. He suggested that the assembly room be divided into two classrooms by a partition as a temporary expedient, but to afford permanent relief, the laboratories should be turned into classrooms, and new laboratories construct-

Mr. Spotton though a first-class echnical school would be the proper thing for London, as it was an important manufacturing centre. The present commercial building might appropriately form part of the technical school.
