## WHITNEY AGAINST HENRY GEORGEISM

Calls It a Nostrum and Has Fripp's Bill Withdrawn.

### THE ASSESSMENT ACT

Amendments Propose an Increase of Exemption From \$1,000 to \$1,200.

Toronto, March 9.—The amendment to the assessment act, introduced by Mr. Fripp, of Ottawa, and embodying a very mild and inoffensive modification of the doctrine of the late Henry George, received short shrift at the hands of Sir James Whitney in the Legislature yesterday. The proposal of Mr. Fripp's bill was that municipalities, instead of imposing the same rate of taxation on lands, improvements, income and business, as at present, should have the option, while retaining the present rate of valuation, of imposing a higher percentage of tax on land than on the other three items of taxable wealth. Sir James delivered the fatal stroke with kind words for the Ottawa member, but for the basic idea of the bill he had only words of scorn. "Nostrum," "panacea," "universal cure for a non-existent disease," were among the terms he used. The bill was withdrawn.

**The Assessment Act.**  
Hon. Mr. Hanna then moved the second reading of the assessment act. This is the act which was passed by the special committee appointed last session, which met during the recess. Since that time the bill had been carefully considered by the statute law revision committee. The first clause of the bill provided that municipalities and similar institutions conducted for gain. The second provided for an increase in the exemption on wages to \$1,200 for married, and \$900 for single men. Strong representations were made to the committee, said Mr. Hanna, especially by railroad men, to make the exemption \$1,500, but he called the attention of the House to the fact that the assessment commissioners of Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa and London had stated that when making assessments they took into consideration the fact that railroad men were forced to live at greater expense than others, and allowed about \$200 on their salaries, in addition to the statutory amount. Other clauses referred to the assessment of express companies, and made clubs liable to a business assessment. Others were of minor importance. One clause referred to taxation of vacant lands in cities, towns and villages, and made a substantial change with regard to the quantity of vacant land which would be taxed. It would be found that under the act there would be no farm, garden, or vacant land assessment, that is, no vacant lands in cities or towns would be assessed as farm lands.

**Mr. Fripp's Proposal.**  
In supporting his bill, Mr. Fripp said that his principle had been favored by some 270 municipalities, while leading newspapers had also endorsed the principle. The proposal was not very radical, and if it was the thin end of the wedge of Henry Georgeism, still it was a good step to take. Under the operation of the amendment, the officers of the municipality adopting it would proceed as heretofore with the assessment of lands and improvements, and striking of the tax rate. Then would come the divergence. In the case of a 20-mill tax rate, 10, 12 or 15 mills would be imposed on the land, and the remainder of the 20 mills being placed on the other three items of improvements, business and income. No existing legislation in Ontario was so unsatisfactory as the present assessment act, but this bill would put the responsibility upon the municipality. No one denied that land values were created by the community, and that the individual owner, yet the value created went to the owner without any effort upon his part. If the land was taxed, the owner must in order to get his money out of it, either improve it, or sell to one who would improve it, but the taxing of improvements was simply taking away the fruits of a man's industry and progress. The present business tax was paid by the consumer, while the income tax was evaded by the rich man, but weighed heavily upon those ill able to pay it. Mr. Fripp proceeded to quote the opinions of some eminent men, including Mr. Tre, the lord advocate of Scotland. He also pointed out that similar systems were in vogue in Australia, New Zealand, as well as in Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, and that to the latter fact a prominent financial authority in the United States had attributed the American invasion of Canada's West.

The city of Ottawa felt strongly on the question, said Mr. Fripp, and had in the city of Ottawa bill sent out never to adopt the system. The subject was of great importance, and Mr. Fripp urged that Ottawa be given power next session to try the experiment. The bill would affect only those holding lands for speculation in order to benefit from the increase of population.

Mr. Stubbins heartily supported the measure, he said. It was a good thing, and should be adopted. He said the governments of other countries had adopted the proposal with great success.

Hon. A. G. MacKay stated that several years ago, under the old Government, he had introduced a measure providing that buildings and improvements should not be assessed higher than 50 per cent of their value, but the resolution had never been seconded. He did not think the question should be made one over which there would be annual contests at elections, though the giving of discretion to rural tax collectors not to tax improvements too high had worked out well in most cases.

Mr. Fripp withdrew his bill, while that of the Hon. Mr. Hanna went to committee.

**To Prevent Disease.**  
Hon. Mr. Duff introduced a bill which is an extension of the old act with respect to San Jose scale. It provides that machinery which for so many years has been used to combat the San Jose scale shall henceforth be used to combat the following diseases as well: Codling moth, yellows, little peach, black knot, pear psylla and pear blight.

It is made an offence for any person to import or sell any plant suffering from any of these diseases. Provision is made that the inspection shall cover any of these diseases.

A change is made in the manner in which inspectors shall be appointed.

**NEW QUEBEC MINISTER.**  
Quebec, Que., March 8.—At a cabinet meeting this morning the Hon. Mr. Perceval was appointed minister without portfolio. Mr. Joseph Aherne has been appointed secretary of the commission on public utilities.

## BOARD OF HEALTH GROWS AGGRESSIVE

Butcher Shops, Eating Houses, Laundries, Etc., To Be Inspected.

### JOB FOR MEDICAL OFFICER

Matter of Bread Inspection Was Left Over for the Time Being—Meeting Yesterday.

The estimates of the board of health total \$3,889 for 1910.

According to the financial statement read yesterday afternoon, the sum of \$7,092.59 was expended last year.

Of this sum, \$2,522.65 was for repairs, etc., to the sanitary hospital, and \$1,660.04 was for the care of smallpox patients.

There was no revenue to offset this expenditure, which was very high. The other expenses were about normal.

The estimates last year were \$5,070, so there was an overdraft of \$2,022.59. That sum has been carried for out of last year's tax rate, and will not be met this year.

The salary of Dr. Tamlin, veterinary inspector, was raised \$50.

The estimates for other expenditures remained about the same. The incidental expenses were placed at \$175. The sum of \$126 was spent last year.

## MORGAN INTERESTS BUY THE E.-M.-F. COMPANY

Detroit Automobile Holdings Go for Five Million Cash.

New York, March 9.—What is considered to be one of the biggest deals in the automobile world and one that foreshadows an immense development of the industry in Detroit, was completed yesterday, when J. P. Morgan & Co., after several weeks of negotiations, succeeded in purchasing the holdings of the Detroit and Fort Huron stockholders in the Everitt-Metzger-Flanders company.

The price paid is said to be slightly

under \$5,000,000, and is on a basis of six to one, which indicates how eager the house of Morgan has been to secure the property. The transaction is a strictly cash one, no stock exchange entering into the deal.

According to the terms of the stock transfer the working personnel of the company remains the same as it has been, with Walter E. Flanders as general manager. He also remains as a member of the board of directors, and retains a block of stock in the new company. Messrs. Book, Palms and Barbour, of Detroit, retire as members of the board of directors, and they will be replaced by Messrs. Stevens and Deland, of the Morgan company.

While no statement can be secured as to the entry of the Morgan company into the automobile field, it is stated that the acquisition of the E.-M.-F. company by the Morgan interests is the first step in the organization of an immense combination which is to be gathered together.
