MANNERS OF TEACHERS INFLUENCE OF NEATNESS

Ontario Pedagogues Hear Remarkable Address by Principal Radcliffe.

Toronto, March 29.—Right from the start, 299 members of the Ontario Educational Association plunged direct into the business constituting the 49th annual meeting, at the University this morning. Dividing into 30 sections they commenced as many rooms, and although numerous members did not arrive in the city until 8 o'clock, 10 o'clock saw them listening, addressing, discussing.

Manners of Teachers.
"Does the character of the latest fad in dressing the hair?" This apparently irrelevant question coming from the lips of Dr. Radcliffe, of Stratford, at a meeting of the training section of the Ontario Educational Association at the university today, was not so flippant as it sounded at first hearing. The chairman, Mr. F. J. Radcliffe, had just concluded a remarkable paper on "The Personality of the Teacher," in which he looked at several matters from unique and refreshing standpoints. Among other things, he rather humorously, but with the keenness of a man, agreeing, however, with the lecturer at the normal school, and he had observed apropos, "We cannot over-estimate the influence on the children of the appearance of an attractive lady with neat clothes and clean linen and adjusted hair."

When, therefore, he was suddenly assailed with this awkward question, for there were ladies eagerly awaiting the answer, his diplomacy bore him safely through a compromising situation. Moved to Abolish Exam.
"I approve of any manner at all of dressing the hair, so long as it is dressed," he replied. But Dr. Radcliffe shook his head, and proceeded to discuss the manners examination, which he described as absurd, although the lectures were in order.

"I move that these manners examinations be abolished, and that the 50 marks assigned for them be awarded for the general personal appearance of the teacher during the term, the judges to be the principal and staff." Professor Scott, of the city normal school readily assented, observing that the state of the hair could be adjudged one incident in the general behavior. Mr. H. T. J. Coleman, the secretary-treasurer, spoke in the strain of the "beam" and the "mood." If we put ourselves under a little self-examination it might help us personally. It would help us if we could assign ourselves 50 marks for general appearance. Looking at our unblacked shoes and considering they had not been blacked for a week we should lose thereby five marks. EAST LONDONERS WANT MORE FIRE PROTECTION

The Mains Are Said To Be Big Enough and an Engine Is Required.

Mr. Thomas Shaw and the committee of East London businessmen who are asking the city council to provide a fire engine for No. 2 hall, have secured a big batch of information which they will present at the meeting of No. 2 committee this evening, when the matter will be again taken up.

East Enders say that information obtained from a "reliable source" proves that the mains are sufficient to supply water enough for a couple of fire engines, but that even if larger mains were laid, the pressure would not be increased to any appreciable extent.

Buy Automobile.
"Let the city purchase an automobile fire engine for the Central station, if it can be proven that the machine will do the work in heavy snow, and send the engine now in use out here," said Mr. Shaw today. "It would certainly be a great saving to put on auto into commission, as three horses would be required, and the fodder for these alone would run into a large sum of money. The capabilities of a fire engine have been questioned by the council, and for that reason the recommendation of Fire Chief Aitken was dealt with rather hastily recently."

Some Information.
A letter from Mr. Shaw says: To the Editor of The Advertiser: Will you kindly allow space in your paper for the following letter and memorandum giving information with reference to fire protection in the East End?

This memorandum we have secured from a reliable source. We want to call the attention of those interested to the following statements regarding the amount of water they can be delivered through the different sized pipes, and while a pressure of 80 pounds had been allowed at the hydrant from the water works, that is static pressure, and no allowance has been made for water used en route. This would reduce the pressure somewhat, say, to 65 pounds or less, and would have corresponding effect on the pressure at the nozzle, which would reduce the force of the stream, and the amount of water delivered per minute.

We also desire to show to the citizens the benefit to be derived from the use of a fire engine for fire purposes, where it will put 60 per cent more water from the same nozzle, with a penetrating force that will reach any building at any point accessible to a stream of water. This is why we want a fire engine in the East End. We are not satisfied to wait longer under the present conditions. We realize our condition from past experience, and will use every effort to induce our representatives at the council board to carry out our wishes. We are glad to note that last year's council left a nice surplus of about \$12,000 as a legacy to this year's council, so there can be no excuse in regard to money matters.

The top of the reservoir at Springbank is 185 feet higher than Rectory street at the G. T. R. tracks. This will equal 80 pounds static pressure, not allowing any reduction for water consumed along the route, and 80 pounds pressure at the hydrant, using 100 feet of 2½-inch with a ½-inch nozzle will bring the pressure down at nozzle to 35 pounds. of 2½-inch hose and a ½-inch nozzle with 80 pounds pressure at the hydrant, will reduce the pressure at the nozzle to 50 pounds.

With 50 pounds pressure at the nozzle at ½-inch stream will go 50 feet high and 45 feet horizontally.

With 35 pounds pressure at the nozzle a ½-inch stream will go 49 feet high and 35 feet horizontally.

A ¼-inch stream, with 50 pounds pressure at the nozzle, will discharge 265 gallons of water per minute.

A ¼-inch stream, with 35 pounds of pressure at the nozzle, will discharge 220 gallons of water per minute.

A ¼-inch stream from a fire engine taking water from a hydrant at 13 pounds pressure and discharging at the nozzle at a pressure of 100 pounds would throw a stream 99 feet high and 89 feet horizontally, and deliver 375 gallons of water minute.

A ¼-inch stream from a fire engine taking water from a hydrant at 13 pounds pressure and discharging at the nozzle at a pressure of 150 pounds would throw a stream 149 feet high

MINERS AND OPERATORS REACH AGREEMENT

Great Strike That Seemed Imminent in Soft Coal District Averted.

Cincinnati, March 29.—The coal mine operators and union miners of Ohio, Indiana and Western Pennsylvania, who have for nearly four weeks been holding daily and nightly conferences regarding the demands of the miners for an increase of 10 cents a ton in wages, an eight-hour day, Saturday half-holiday, and other concessions, late this afternoon arrived at an agreement that will, at least, avoid a strike. The miners accepted an advance of only 5 cents a ton maximum, and other points of disagreement were adjusted amicably through mutual concessions.

In a statement issued tonight by Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, who have also been holding daily sessions here, he says: "Stock gamblers in coal will be the most disappointed of all the men who tried to bring about a strike affecting the mining industry of the entire country. I hope that they will be required to pay the penalty of their own folly."
