HUSBAND'S DEATH SOON FOLLOWED THAT OF WIFE

Terribly Sudden Demise of Mr. and Mrs. Tott n at Toronto.

Mr. Joseph Totton, of 702 Waterloo street, has been called to Toronto to attend the double funeral there this afternoon of his father and mother. Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Totton, of 625 Broadview avenue, whose deaths occurred under unusually pathetic circumstances.

Mrs. Totton had been in good health up until Sunday night, and retired at her usual hour. Her demise occurred suddenly between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning.

Her husband, who came to Toronto from Belfast, Ireland, where he had engaged in the linen business, sixteen years ago, and who had since lived retired, was also in fair health, but the shock proved so severe that he never rallied, and his death resulted only 43 hours after that of his wife. Mrs. Totton was 65 years of age, and her husband was two years her senior. Mr. Totton was a native of Portadown, County Armagh, Ireland. He had never made his home in this city, but had visited with his son here.

ALMOST LOST SIGHT BY BURNING FUSE

Mr. E. Dawson Suffered Dangerous Accident Tuesday Night.

Mr. E. Dawson, 563 Dufferin avenue, an operator at the hydro-electric station, Horton street, had his eyes so badly burned on Tuesday evening by the explosion of a fuse that for a time it was feared that the sight would be destroyed. AN ARTISTIC CONCERT IN THE FIRST CHURCH

Excellent Program By Mr. A. D. Jordan, Assisted By First Methodist Choir.

The First Presbyterian Church was crowded last night by a music-loving audience, who were treated to one of the finest concerts of the season by the First Methodist Church choir.

Mr. Albert D. Jordan, the solo organist, was unusually efficient, and was compelled to respond to three encores. Numbers particularly pleasing were: "Toccata," in F Major (Vidor); encore number, "Turkish Patrol" (Beethoven); serenade by Schubert, which is played on two keyboards; encore numbers, "Humoresque" (Dvorak), "Badrage" (Victor Herbert).

Miss Beatrice Hunt sang the solo in "Father, to Thee We Pray"; in pleasing voice, and won applause from the audience.

Mr. Robert Habbeshaw, tenor, sang the tenor solo in "Sanctus" in a very artistic manner.

The full choir of the First Methodist Church rendered four numbers. The members showed careful training, their attack, shading and enunciation being superb. They excelled in Mr. Jordan's "Christmas Carol," the bass section being especially good, and would have done credit to a professional organization.

The double quartette, composed of Messrs. Kidner, Mountjoy, Layman, Messrs. Habbeshaw, Chapman, Greenslade and Soper, sang the quartette in "Who Is Like Unto Thee" very sweetly, and with artistic harmony.
