PASSENGER LINER HIT IN COLLISION

Dutch Ship Ryndam Struck by Freighter Off Nantucket Shoal.

WIRELESS BRINGS HELP

No Lives Lost, Battleships Taking Off Passengers and Part Crew.

[Canadian Press.]
New York, May 26.—The Dutch lines Ryndam, which sailed from this port yesterday for Rotterdam with 77 pas sengers and a million-dollar cargo, was badly damaged in a collision fifteen mile southwest of the Nantucket shoals lightship at 4 o'clock this morning with the tramp freighter Joseph J. Cuneo, which sailed from Boston last night, for Bar-

Both vessels were seriously damaged. The Ryndam, wireless reports indicate, was struck aft with such force that hold No. 5 filled almost at once, water flowed freely into the engine-room, and began to creep up in hold No. 6.

Passengers Transferred.

The Cuneo's bows were smashed in badly. S. O. S. signal was wirelessed from the Ryndam's wireless, and her passengers were transferred hastily to the Cuneo. One hundred and sixty of the Ryndam's crew of two hundred likewise were put aboard the freighter, leaving only forty men aboard the liner to

U. S. battleships in the vicinity ans wered the wireless calls. At 7 o'clock, three hours after the collision, the battleship South Carolina was standing alongside the Cuneo. The Ryndam's passengers and those of her crew who had been transferred to the Cuneo were taken off by the South Carolina, The battleship was directed by wireless from the Newport navy yard to convoy the stricken liner to this port.

Engines Strained.
With the South Carolina alongside the battleship Texas, ten miles astern, the battleship Louisiana in the near vicinity, and the Cuneo slowly follow-Ryndam was steaming at slow speed for this port, 124 miles east of the Ambrose Channel lightship at 10 c'clock. At that hour her captain sent a wireless message to the Holland-American Line, her owners, saying that the Ryndham's engines were much strained, but still holding out. Previous messages from Capt. Van

Der Heuvel asserted that the water was gaining in No. 6 hold and that the ship would have to be abandoned if water gained much more. So far as the line knew, there were only six Americans among the passengers. The other passengers, it was said,




