ANGLO-AMERICAN VESTRY
AGE LIMIT NOW
EIGHTEEN YEARS

Synod Rejects Diocesan Council
For Social Service As
Report Suggests.

NAME COMMITTEES
Delegates Believe Mission Work
In India Should Receive
Greater Attention.

Approval of a canon providing for
the change of the age limit for mem-
bers of the vestry from twenty-one
years to eighteen; refusal to form a
diocesan council for social service,
according to the suggestion contained
in the report submitted by Very Rev.
Dean Tucker, chairman of the com-
mittee on social service; and the re-
ferring to a special committee ap-
pointed by the bishop the proposal
that the church fire insurance be
taken over by the diocese, were three
steps taken by the Synod of Huron
at its concluding session in Cronyn
Hall yesterday afternoon.

Many of the delegates left for their
homes by the early afternoon trains,
but sufficient remained to the con-
clusion that there was no lack of en-
thusiasm or interest as the final items
of business were conducted.

A stir of more than casual interest
was occasioned when figures pre-
sented by the committee on civil
census indicated that there was a
disparagement of more than forty
per cent between the number of
Anglicans reported by the civil census
and those shown by the clergy's re-
port. The bishop signified his in-
tention of bringing the question up
at the rural deaneries in order that
in some measure at least the num-
ber of Anglicans claiming relation-
ship with the church should more
nearly approach the number of those
in actual communion.

With expressions of cordial enthu-
siasm, the synod expressed its will-
ingness to accede to the request of
Rev. Dr. Gould, general secretary of
the M.S.C.C., that his lordship the
Bishop of Huron be allowed to take
his place in representing Canada on
the international mission conference
which is to be held in Oxford next
summer.

There was a bit of interesting dis-
cussion over the resolution sub-
mitted by Rev. Henry Smith to the
effect that the Women's Guilds be
made responsible in a greater meas-
ure to the rector of the parish and
the vestry in their financial under-
takings. It was evident that the
clergy considered this a "tick-
lish" matter, requiring some degree
of tact. It was finally referred to the
executive for consideration.

Report on Bishop's Charge.

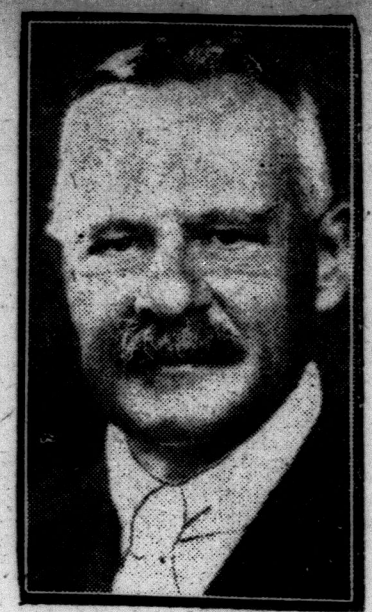
The following report was submitted
by the committee appointed to con-
sider the bishop's charge:
That the synod approves of the co-
operation of the Anglicans, Congrega-
tionalists, Methodists and Presby-
terians on the subject of the place of
the Bible on the public school cur-
riculum, but while recognizing the
value of such joint action and ac-
knowledging the excellent work done
in our Sunday schools, something
further is desirable, and we recom-
mend that the parishes of the diocese
make some arrangements locally
whereby, during the summer vaca-
tion, schools for religious instruction
be instituted. (a) Where possible in
co-operation with other communions
in the public schools. (b) Where this
is not possible that the individual
churches of one communion should
hold classes for religious instruction
in their own buildings. That this
synod believes that the time has
come when our missionary work in
India should receive greater atten-
tion, and that the church so that what
undertaken may be commensurate
with the importance of that country
and with the work in China and Ja-
pan. That this synod reaffirms its
belief in the unity of the churches of
Christ and accept as its basis for
promoting this unity the basis of such
unity as it is set forth in "The Ap-
peal to Paul Christian Peoples," issued
by the Lambeth conference, follow-
ing with profitable consideration
every movement working toward
the goal of unity, it believes that the
only union which can be worked for
is such as would be recognized by
our communion throughout the
world and comparable with the his-
toric witness of the Church of Eng-
land. That the sections of
charge dealing with "The Trend of
Religious Education," "The Miscon-
ception of the Church," and "The
Powers That Be," be printed and
sent to the clergy to be used by them
as sermons or sermon material on a
special Sunday to be appointed by
the bishop.

RECOMMEND CITY
TO PAVE STANLEY
STREET AS TEST

Transportation Committee To
Advise Council To Act
At Once.

WILL BE 'SHOW DOWN'

Engineer Near Will Be Directed
To Notify Street Railway
Company.

The stage is fitted up for Mayor
Wenig's long-heralded "show-down"
with the London Street Railway Cor-
poration.

In special caucus yesterday after-
noon the members of the city coun-
cil's transportation committee con-
cluded that the time for action had
arrived, and they propose to make
a test case of the Stanley street
paving project.

A recommendation to this effect
went to the city council for final
action Monday night, and City
Engineer Near will be directed to give
the company seven days' notice in
conformity with bylaw 916) that the
city intends to pave the thorough-
fare in question, and that it is their
desire that the company undertake
its track allowance. In lieu of no move
from the railway authorities within
that specified time, the city engineer
will be authorized to proceed with
the work on the eighth day, charging
the same to the company.

City Engineer Near reported yes-
terday that although he had already
served notice upon the company with
respect to Stanley, Richmond and
Adelaide streets, no reply had been
forthcoming as to their intention. I
had been whispered, however, he re-
lated, that the company was prepared
to wait for a "show-down."
"Well, this is the day for the
show-down," declared Mayor Wenig.
"Let's instruct the engineer to start
at once and charge them for it. We
won't have a show-down unless we
do something."

Urges Caution.

Ald. John Greer was quite favor-
able toward the proposed pavement,
but urged caution before they rushed
"blindfolded" into doubtful litigation.
"It is the engineer's clear on his au-
thority in this," he questioned.
"Take my instructions from the
council," explained the engineer.
"They take any legal action that be-
comes imperative." "We know that he
will say no. Bylaw 916 is quite clear
as to our procedure."

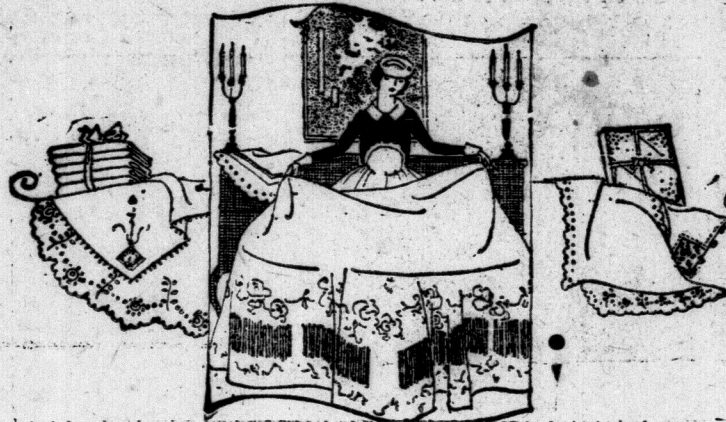
Willing To Test Case.
Ald. Greer questioned whether the
Ontario Railway and Municipal
Board have any right to interfere and
upset any clauses in the city's agree-
ment with the company.

"Oh they know that 916 is all
right," adjudged Ald. Watt. "Why
I have been asked to use my influence
to see that pressure is not brought
to bear to enforce it, as they were
extremely hard up."

CLAIM PLYMPTON FARMER

SECURED FUNDS BY FRAUD

Sarnia, May 17.—Robt. W. Bright,
a farmer residing in the township of
Plympton, near Camlachie, is in the
county jail here on a charge of ob-
taining about \$2,000 in the form of a
loan from the Bank of Commerce at
Forest on October 25, 1921, by making
false statements in writing that his
assets were \$26,106 and his liabilities
\$2,616.
It is stated that at a meeting of
Bright's creditors in the summer of
1922, it was disclosed that his assets
amounted to about \$20,000 and his
liabilities \$16,300, and it was subse-
quently alleged that many of the
values which he had given for his
holdings were not the real values. An
assignment was made on November
22, 1922. A suit to set aside certain
mortgages on Bright's properties has
also been started.
