

HUNDRED MILLION Canada Buys Far Less, While Her Sales Show Big Increase.

BILLION IN EXPORTS

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, March 29. - Imports of oreign goods into Canada show a lecrease and exports of domestic commodities an increase for the 12 months ended February 28 last, as ompared with the previous twelve

The value of foreign goods imported into Canada during the twelve months concluding with the close of last February was \$799,278,046. For the previous twelve months period importations were valued at \$898,-383,916. Of the total imports during the period ended with February of the present year, dutiable goods to the value of \$520,586,628 entered Canada and free goods amounting in value to \$278,691,418.

Domestic exports during the twelve months ended February last were valued at \$1,066,681,325, as compared with \$1,029,478,881, in the previous twelve months period.




