A Great and Worthy Effort. Of deaths from tuberculosis it has been found that fifteen per cent were children under ten years of age. These children were not born with the disease, because it has been proved that a child at birth is free from the taint, although the parents may be tubercular.

It is this idea of getting the potential tubercular case when it is young that offers the greatest chance for effective work and positive cure. The same idea runs through medicine, surgery, juvenile courts or any one of a number of activities. Operations for appendicitis are comparatively simple when taken in time; cancer lends itself to surgical skill in the earlier stages; juvenile courts stop the development of criminals because they are able to reach the trouble early, and the treatment of tubercular trouble in children offers similar large rewards in the way of success.
