

SEEKING A NEW PASS.

Provincial Government Send An Engineer to Explore Inland from Kitamaat Arm.

From the Coast to Hazelton An Almost Flat Route is Said to Exist.

The possibility of finding out an almost level pass from the Coast to the open country to the east of the Coast range, is the reason that Mr. Edward Wilkinson, O.E., left on the Tees last night for the North under instructions from the Provincial government.

The first capabilities of the country after the seventy miles from the coast are excellent for agricultural purposes and the north and east is a vast mineral country as yet practically unexplored.

It is, therefore, because of these mineral resources that Mr. J. A. Carthew left by the Tees in charge of a prospecting party for private individuals, with the intention of examining the streams running into the Copper river.
