





Ottawa, May 4.-The Columbia Western railway company received the sanction of the Commons railway colling mittee to an increase of bonding pow Midway, 100 miles, and branches there from. An application for a similar in crease on the extension to Penticton wa dropped. The bill was vigorously opposed by Messrs. Bostock, Robertson and Richardson, who claimed the pres-ent bonding powers of \$25,000 per mile were quite sufficient.

He also said that they did n employ any Canadians on construction, Swedes and Italians from Chicago being engaged in building the road, and i would be just as well to have Ohinese on the work. In this case the town o Grand Forks was being side-tracked be-cause the people would not give about one-third of all they had to the Oanadian Pacific railway. All that Grand Forks wanted was justice.

Mr. Blair expressed sympathy with Grand Forks, and said the legislation which he would introduce this session to cover cases of this kind would be purposely made retroactive. Mr. Blain was satisfied that \$35,000 bonding power was not excessive, as the road would cost \$150,000 per mile in some places.
