THREE MEN SHOT IN PISTOL FIGHT

Former U. S. Navy Man Claims He Killed Three Bandits Single-handed

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 7.—Three men were shot and killed in a terrific pistol fight at a roadside near Upper Greve-Coeur Lake, St. Louis County, Mo., today. James Quinn, one of the proprietors, said he killed the three men single-handed. The dead men were Vincent Goodie, 21, Don Jean Hoffmann, 24, and James Tully all alleged gangsters.

Quinn, who was unhurt, told authorities the shooting resulted from an attempted hold-up and he was under fire not only of the men killed but of two others who escaped. Quinn is 34 years old and a former member of the United States Navy. Although the bodies of the dead men bearing seventeen wounds, seemed to indicate expert firing, Quinn declared he had never before fired a shot.

PRIVATE OWNERSHIP NOT A REMEDY

Sir Henry Thornton Says Private Ownership of C. N. R. Would Not Make It Earn More

Montreal, Oct. 6.—"If the Canadian National railways could be transferred to private ownership, it would not earn one more dollar than it does today," said Sir Henry Thornton, president of the system, in an address here last night.

"The fact that it is a state owned institution is not the trouble at all," declared Sir Henry. "The whole difficulty is due to the fact that a decade or so ago, in an outburst of enthusiasm and perhaps patriotic optimism, many more miles of railways were built in this country than there was any immediate necessity for. You cannot build railways in a new country and expect them to pay at once."

Sir Henry said he was convinced that too much mileage and too fast construction were responsible for Canadian National Railway's troubles. He thought that more population would be a great help in putting the C. N. R. on its feet.

The speaker said a great and prosperous future for the Dominion and he described as "nonsensical" the stories in circulation about national disaster being just around the corner.

DWELLING DAMAGED IN MONDAY'S FIRE

Blaze in House On Dunstan St. Caused Loss of About \$600

Fire which broke out on Monday evening about six o'clock in a dwelling on Dunstan Street occupied by John Dunstan, caused damage to the extent of about \$600. The loss was covered by insurance.

The blaze originated in the second floor of the building and the firemen, who made a prompt response to the alarm, succeeded in confining the fire to that part of the house. Downstairs the loss was largely smoke and water. The exact cause of the fire is undetermined.

The brigade was called out again about 8 o'clock the same evening when fire again broke out on the roof of the building. This, however, was promptly extinguished.

MANY RETURNING FROM THE U.S.

Tide of Exodus Seems To Have Turned To Canada

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—The following statement was sent out today by the Department of Immigration: "Canadians continue to return to Canada from the United States in large numbers. Although the tide of emigration is not yet complete it is estimated that in that month alone 5,000 Canadians who had been resident in the United States for more than six months returned to Canada declaring their intention of remaining permanently in this country."

"In the same period about 1800 persons entered Canada from the United States as immigrants largely of the agricultural class as bringing with them cash and effects to enable them to begin farm operations in Canada."

"Some idea of the traffic in tourist and non-immigrant classes is gained from the fact that in September two million persons of these classes entered the United States from Canada. This is increasing, the movement of Canadians to the United States is falling off very sharply."

"At the principal boundary ports the Canadians, both native born and naturalized, admitted to the United States during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1924, numbered 28,390. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1925, the number of Canadians admitted to the United States at the same port numbered 14,708—a falling off of practically fifty per cent."

GOOD RESULTS ALREADY SEEN

Outlook Good For Success of Gaspe Coast Automobile Club And Its Proposed Work

With a large membership, composed mostly of business men, throughout the Gaspe Peninsula, the newly formed Gaspe Coast Automobile Club gives promise of filling a long-felt need in that territory and bringing about much needed improvements in the roads of the coast. According to our representative, who has just returned from that district, the present outlook indicates that this new organization will be able to carry out a very progressive program of work in the coming months. Results of the influence of the new club are already apparent and before long much more far-reaching benefits may be expected.

The fact that winter is drawing near, will mean little or nothing to the new association. There are certain phases of the club's proposed work which can only be completed between seasons and the officials of the club are planning to go right ahead with this during the coming winter. No definite official announcement regarding this work can yet be made, but plans include the issuing of a proper map and road sketch of the Gaspe territory together with suitable advertising literature. The winter work will also embrace much preliminary work in connection with a definite campaign for road improvements. It is expected that the provincial government will be approached with a view to enabling government co-operation and financial assistance and also the co-operation of all municipal citizens of that territory will be sought to lend their sympathy and support.

MONCTON PLEASD PEOPLE ACTIVE

Courtesy Well Improvements Will Also Well Serve Moncton Interests

Moncton, Oct. 2.—The Order-in-Council under which work is to be proceeded with at once on the Courtesay Bay Improvements, St. John, has given courage in the business section of the city. The plans will provide the much needed facilities for the arrival of the upkeep service and successfully do its western business through the Port of St. John instead of at present through Portland, Me. In the handling of the material necessary to the material increase in the staffs of all of the departments of the freight service, as there must also be in the staffs of the upkeep service; and the new men and their families, thus brought into town will naturally take up their abode in Moncton. The upkeep service of Moncton is just such conditions and such service that the business community and citizens generally appreciate. St. John and Moncton and Westmorland will therefore be disposed to work hand in hand in providing the welfare of the two largest constituencies in New Brunswick.

BACK FROM NORTH

"Arctic" Reported By Wireless in Strait of Belle Isle

Quebec, Oct. 5.—News was received here yesterday from Ottawa that the "Arctic" had returned to the coast. Captain Joseph Bernier, of Levis, had so far progressed on his return trip from northern waters, that his vessel, the auxiliary schooner "Arctic," was reported by wireless to have entered the Strait of Belle Isle.

Such being the case it is evident that the famous navigator, who is returning from his eleventh trip to the frozen north, intends to keep the promise made shortly before he sailed on the present expedition last June which was to the effect that he would conduct the "Arctic" back to Quebec in the early part of October.

NEWCASTLE YOUTH ACCIDENTLY SHOT

Leroy Vye Found in Pasture With a Bullet Through His Heart

Newcastle, N. B., Oct. 5.—A very sad accident occurred Saturday evening around supper time, when Leroy Vye, adopted son of Mr. Addison Vye, was found fatally shot with a bullet through his heart. Early in the afternoon he started to town with a hoe and rifle to be repaired. Coming back at supper time he took a short cut to the pasture for his cows. The cows coming home and the boy not with them, his father got anxious and started to look for him. A short distance from his home he was found lying on his back with the rifle by his side, shot through the heart. It is supposed he stumbled and the rifle discharging in some unknown way. He was 18 years of age and a son of Mrs. Bertha Vye.

F. M. TWEEDIE LIBERAL CHOICE

Second Choice Made Necessary by the Death of W. B. Snowball

Newcastle, N. B., Oct. 3.—At the second convention of the Liberals of Northumberland County held here yesterday afternoon, F. M. Tweedie was selected as the candidate of the party in this constituency, in succession to the late W. B. Snowball, regret for whose death was expressed in a resolution adopted by the convention. The principal speaker was the new Secretary of the State, Hon. W. E. Foster, who dealt chiefly with transportation matters.

Three names were placed in nomination, those of Mr. Tweedie, C. J. Morrissy, son of the late Hon. John Morrissy, a former member from Northumberland, and R. G. Gill of Barnaby River. MANY ENROLL FOR EVENING STUDY

Evening Classes in Vocational Training - Opened Tuesday With Attendance of 104—Motor Mechanics Class to Start Oct. 27.

The fall term of the Evening Classes in Vocational training opened in the Grammar School on Tuesday night with a total enrollment of 104 students.

The above registration is considered good but the hope expressed by the Director is that this number may be considerably increased. With the exception of the class in Typewriting, which is already up to the number which can be accommodated by present facilities, there is room for many more pupils and all those interested are urged to enroll.

The class in Motor Mechanics will not open until the 27th of October and it is hoped that many will take advantage of this and make arrangements to enroll for this branch of vocational work.

It is worthy of mention that with each successive term, evening study in vocational training is steadily gaining favor in Campbellton. It is fortunate for those attending that the staff of teachers have always been eminently competent and doubtless this fact has been largely responsible for the success of vocational work here. With each year the ambitious student is also becoming more generally recognized. Vocational training is rapidly becoming a very important phase of our educational system and it is gratifying to know this Campbellton is appreciating more fittingly the advantages of this training here.

LOCAL BOY HERO IN FIRE ESCAPE

Young Clive Sanson Rescues Car From Burning Garage At Doaktown—Wakens Party Before Hotel Burns

A somewhat unusual story of the escape of a party of Campbellton people from fire at Doaktown, in which young Clive Sanson figures as the hero, came to light here today. The party consisting of Mr. Angus Dewar, Mr. and Mrs. Salmon of Atholville, Mr. Haylock, Sanson and his young Clive, left Campbellton on Friday morning last enroute to Fredericton. Reaching Doaktown that night they put up at the hotel there, all being tired after the days run.

According to the story, young Clive was restless and could not sleep. About 2:30 he heard something that sounded like fire and on looking out of his window, discovered that the garage, in which their car was stored, was in flames. Without stopping to dress, Clive rushed down stairs and out to the garage. He found the building locked, but securing a push stick, managed to break the lock, although burning his hand as he did so. The door swung open and Clive was met by a rush of hot smoke but feeling his way with difficulty, he got into the building. Releasing the brakes he gave the vehicle a push and it rolled out as easily as a baby carriage.

Having thus rescued the car, Clive then rushed back to the hotel and awakened the inmates. This was accomplished none too soon as a gasoline tank located in another part of the burning garage exploded, spreading fire in all directions. The flames quickly enveloped the big hotel building and in an instant the structure was razed to the ground. The Campbellton people escaped without injury and arrived in Fredericton shortly after daylight.

Clive recognized as the hero of the incident, and rightly so. The car, at least, would doubtless have been lost had it not been for his cool-headedness and prompt action in an exciting moment.
