John Bright on Canada. John B ight is not the man to say a goo word for Canada, but he need not show himself so pager as he appears to be to pu in a bad word for this country at every opportunity. On Thursday, Jan 29, he made a speech at Birmingham, reports of which are to hand by mil. He ridiculed

the idea of imperial federation, and was even bitter in denouncing the system of pretection which has been adopted in Canada. He thought it extraordinary that Sir John Macdonald should, after having established p otoction here, have the 'f.ce' to appear at meetings in London as ar gavocate of federation. But the truth i that Sr J ha took particular good care to avoid anything that could be called false pretences. He gave it distinctly to be inderstood from the first that in no case whatever would Canada agree to any arrangement that would involve the sanifice of her right to frame her own tariff to suit her own circumstances. And this view of what was necessary was accepted by Mr. Forster, also by the London Times, both saying in effect that powers already given to the colonies could

The demand for the power of making our own treaties has been made by Mr Blake, and Mr. Bright takes this to mean s paration. "That," said he, "is very much like, not federation, but the entir freedom of Canada"-and he adds tha when Canada wants to go E gland wit not hinder. An explanation from Mr Blake would be in order now.

Mr. Bright characterizes as "child:s and absurd" the idea of Canadians and Australians sicting in the inperial par liament; and there we are happy to agrewith him. But let us add that this "childish and absurd" idea is tertainly no favored by Canadian protectionists. For were we to send representatives to th Buish house of commons, we should hav o surrender the commercial independence which we now possess. And that we car taidly are not going to do.

As has been said in these columns be fore, Canadians will certainly not sur render the solid reality of commercial in dependence for the glitteriag bauble o imperial representation. No dog and shadow business for Canada, if we can

We dare say there are people in Eag land who have hoped to see Canadians, s well as other colonists, so tickled with the shadew as to drop the substance in orde to get hold of it. But we fancy that an such hope as that indicated is a good de fainter now than it was a few months ago The real truth of the matter is that th more imperial federation in examined and discussed, the more clearly it is seen to b visionary and impracticable. Sir Job said this in effect when he was in England and had Mr. Bright been more caudid on better posted, he might have had the pleasure of saying that on this point he the Eng i h free trader, was happy to agre with the Canadian protectionist.

But though imperial federation be more illusion, an alliance of Great Britai and all her colonies may yet become a rea ity. Mr B ight would jamp at the chanc of an alliance with the United Stateswhy not one with the colonies to begi with? If protection he the barrie then the American tar ff is higher tha ours. Americans and Canadians are boti protectionists, and Great Bitain treat both alike in her markets. Why, then, a mili and persuasive to our neighbors while so harsh and repellent to us, Me Bright will probably claim that, as a E glishman, he is a lover of fair play; so, let him bestow upon Canada as muc friendly consideration as he does upon th United S ates.

Cheap Emigration.

The Trades and Labor council appea to think that if they can only get the dominion government to abolish the sys tem of absisted passages, the juffax of des titute emigrante into Canada will coas: But if so they are laboring under a grea de asion. For the steamship companie and the railway companies together ar quite able and determined to keep the business going whether the governmen give any assistance or not.
