MEMBERS ATTEND DINNER

Extension of Agricultural Education Is Discussed

An outline of the work to be undertaken at the meetings of the Western Ontario O. A. C. alumni during the next six months was decided upon at the first of the gatherings, held last night in the Royal Cafe following a dinner.

Educational extension, both agricultural and cultural, will be the main object of the six students of the Guelph College.

The meetings during this season will be held in various sections of Western Ontario, so that the members of each district may have one of the gatherings within reasonable distance of their homes.

The following monthly meetings were decided upon: Stratford in November, Hamilton in January (during the corn show), London in February, and Windsor in March.

On motion of J. H. Wheaton and J. Johnston, it was finally decided to accept the recommendation of the executive to deal with the matter of education at the season meetings.

A. R. G. Smith, of New Hamburg, gave the gathering an interesting talk in "Community Leadership." He pointed out, in his opening remarks, how important it was from a national standpoint to have good leadership. The idea would be the highest development of Canadian citizenship for leadership.

The speaker declared that he was very interested in finding communities where the people knew something in addition to the price of cattle and corn. He was delighted when he found a community where they were interested in English literature, art or science, which went to make up a better citizenship.

In closing his address Mr. Smith urged upon his audience to do their best to lead the community in which they live with loyalty and for the better development of this great country.

HIGHWAY GET \$125 FROM BROCKVILLE MAN

BROCKVILLE, Oct. 28.—A. W. Welch, insurance agent, was held up to last night at the point of a revolver by three men while motoring on the line of Wales highway between Spenceville and Prescott and robbed of \$125 cash.

The men blocked the road with their car at the Grand Trunk Railway crossing and thereby forced Welch to stop. They then surrounded the car and forced him to deliver up the money.

Police are working on the case. The men wore military raincoats and had their faces covered with balaclava caps.

VELYN NESBIT HAS A NARROW ESCAPE

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(Associated Press Dispatch.)—Evelyn Nesbit, once wife of Harry K. Thaw, and later movie actress, took all overdose of morphine to-day and screamed to a hospital, posted outside her apartment, to get her, that she had swallowed enough poison to kill 20 persons.

She is recovering, however, a physician said, but making a hurry call to the coroner's inquest.

Recalled her theater district rooming house, and she has been facing a prosecution for the same.

Evelyn was resting comfortably to-day. Her financial distress, which caused her to take the overdose, came light a month ago when a city marshal appeared at her rooming house with an eviction warrant. Miss Nesbit was ordered to pay over \$100 in the 30-day month term and her \$150 on upstairs. The marshal went away.

To-day another came on a similar mission and began taking pictures of the street while Miss Nesbit sobbed, ringing her hands and frantically called her lawyer on the telephone. The lawyer obtained a truce of a few hours with the landlord and Miss Nesbit began calling friends in the hope of raising some cash. In this she failed.

A few minutes afterwards the landlord of the window and screamed at the marshal that she had taken the morphine and was going to die. An ambulance surgeon came running and used stomach pump.

The landlord, on hearing about the episode, announced he would wait until next Monday before pressing for eviction.

OPPOSANTS CAVEAT NO REAL FAULTS GOVERNMENT'S RECORD

Messrs. Crerar and King Forced to Raise False Issues in the Campaign, Premier Meighen Tells Great Audience of Five Thousand People at Toronto

MAGNIFICENT WELCOME TO PRIME MINISTER

Mr. Meighen Contrasts Government's Definite Policy to the Wobbly Attitude of Hon. MacKenzie King; Opponents United in Nothing But Desire for Office

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—(By Canadian Press Staff Correspondent.)—"I am not here begging on my own behalf or on behalf of any member of my Government. I am here to lay before you the great issues at stake, which you must decide."

With these words Premier Meighen prefaced a speech delivered to nearly 5,000 persons gathered in Massey Hall this evening—a speech in which he explained the lines of policy which had actuated the Government in the past, reaffirmed his belief in a fiscal program of moderate protection for Canada and declared his intention of following the course which the Government had pursued in tariff matters if returned to power.

The premier's speech was not an apology or a defense. He did not assume that the Government had come through the years of war and the period of reconstruction following it without some mistakes, but he insisted that the mistakes had been made in the great decisions of the Government had been wise and that the country, after passing through one of the most shattering upheavals which the world had experienced, was strong and healthy.

OPPOSANTS IN BAD PLIGHT. The foes of the Government, he insisted, were forced to create false issues in the campaign. He said the Government, therefore, he averred, Mr. King was "trying to impress the people with the terrible shock he suffered when he found that we were receiving shells, to which we were entitled, from England," and "Mr. Crerar, after much mental perspiration, throwing up his hands and declaring that 'something must be done.'"

Mr. Meighen contrasted the position of the Government and those opposed to the Government. "We have come forward with a definite, consistent stand on every big issue before the electors," he said. "We are opposed by an aggregation, which is united on nothing but heaven and earth, save gaining power."

Mr. Meighen's speech was delivered by Hon. Edmund Bristol, minister without portfolio in the Meighen Government. J. W. Edwards, minister of health, immigration and colonization, and Miss Adelaide M. Clayton, of Listowel.

Mr. Edwards introduced the premier minister in a short speech. The hall, which is one of the largest in the country, was quite inadequate to hold the crowd which sought admittance, and the premier addressed a large overflow meeting from the balcony of the building, before speaking to those inside.

The street was specially lighted in order that it might be seen. Col. J. A. Currie and Dr. Sheard also addressed the overflow meeting.

Returned men, who had lost limbs in the war, were given special sections of the hall having been reserved for their accommodation.

Long before the meeting was scheduled to begin, and even before the doors of Massey Hall were opened, hundreds of persons lined the streets in the vicinity. When the doors were opened, it took but a few minutes to fill all the available seating space with the exception of the stage, which was reserved for the favored ones with badges. This also filled rapidly.

ON THE PLATFORM. Among those on the platform were Miss Constance Bolton, president of the Ladies' Liberal—Conservative Association, of Centre Toronto; Sir Edward Kemp, Hon. Edmund Bristol, K.C., minister without portfolio in the present Government; Dr. Sheard, candidate in South Toronto and former member; H. C. Hocken, candidate in West Toronto; who formerly represented that constituency; Mayor Church, who is contesting the North Toronto riding; J. H. Harris, candidate in East Toronto; W. F. MacLean, of South York, and D. Spence, who has been chosen to carry the Conservative colors in Parkdale.

Davis Spence, nominee in Parkdale, was chairman of the meeting, and Mayor Church acted as secretary. The premier to Toronto. He referred to Mr. Meighen's attendance at the University of Toronto, and spoke strongly in favor of a protective tariff. "Toronto is a city that has been made by a protective tariff," he said.

Hon. Edmund Bristol said the election was a great and momentous one, in which every man, woman and child was interested. He presented a number of arguments in support of a protective policy. In Toronto alone there were 155 branches of the manufacturing industry which would not be here if the tariff wall had not been in existence. Free trade would wipe out the home market of the Canadian farmer.

Hon. Dr. J. W. Edwards, minister of health, immigration and colonization, said that Premier Meighen was putting up the greatest battle for the future of the country that had ever been waged by a political leader since Confederation. "I am proud of him," said Dr. Edwards, "because he preaches the same doctrine from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

"No pussy footing side—stopping by our premier, we leave that to those of the opposing parties," continued Dr. Edwards.

Would you like the Government to open the doors and allow all the foreigners from Europe to come in who wish to settle here?" asked Dr. Edwards. This brought a chorus of "no" from the audience.

"Telegrams and letters pour in on me night and day asking that certain people from Europe be allowed to enter Canada. I have no doubt if we permitted them all to come the boats would be crowded all winter with immigrants. There are perhaps two or three millions of people in Europe waiting to get away from their own countries."

The speaker said that the Government would be condemned if these people were allowed to enter Canada freely, and just as the workers should be protected from the competition of a crowd of foreigners coming in, so the industries which give the workers employment should be protected from the goods of foreign industries.

Dr. Edwards took up the grain inquiry. "Who stopped it?" someone shouted. "Crerar and those associated with him stopped it," said Dr. Edwards. He argued that if Mr. Crerar and those associated with him had nothing to fear from a probe of the grain trade in the West he was surprised that they should have made such efforts to stop it.

The prime minister, in opening, emphasized that he was appealing to the people, not on personal grounds, but on the big issues that now confront the electors of Canada.

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DRURY TURNS FIRST SOD PLANNED T. & N. O. EXTENSION

In Luncheon After Cochrane Ceremony He Characterizes Talk of Secession in North Ontario as "Utter Nonsense"

CITE COCHRANE, Ont., Oct. 28.—In the presence of a gathering of 3,000 persons, drawn from every point in Northern Ontario, Premier E. C. Drury at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon turned the first sod in the projected extension of the Toronto and Northern Ontario Railroad from Cochrane, 70 miles toward Oil Can Portage. A special train of 13 cars came from North Bay and another train of five cars brought people from the Ingeholm Falls district. At a luncheon by the Cochrane

Board of Trade, Premier Drury emphasized the Government's belief in the future of the North country, and stated that other large undertakings had prevented previous action on the extension by the Government. He wished he was as sure of the success of the Hydro-Electric development as he was of the James Bay extension of the T. & N. O.

The premier referred to the talk of secession as "utter nonsense." The Government's aim, he pointed out, was to place the T. & N. O. on a self-supporting basis.

Urges Kiwanians To Practice Club's Ideals At All Times

District Governor Hay Addresses Members of the Ingersoll Branch

INGERSOLL, Oct. 26.—(Special to The Free Press).—One of the most inspiring Kiwanis meetings yet held in Ingersoll was that addressed to-day by J. B. Mr. Murray said that there was no work that could make life so bright for a man as helping those children of circumstance who could not help themselves. There was nothing that would so much exalt a man as to help a boy as having some boy to share an equal chance with other boys in more favorable circumstances. Kiwanians in London were doing everything possible to help boys to become 100 per cent. citizens when they reached the estate of manhood.

BELIEVE PAIR IMPLICATED IN ONTARIO BANK ROBBERIES

Police of This Province Express This View After Studying Description of Slade and O'Hara, Held by Montreal Police

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—A search of the baggage of Albert Slade, arrested here on a charge of attempting to hold up a bank and believed to be Norman Ryan, alias "Texan" Bell, wanted for bank robbery in Hamilton, Ont., revealed a large number of bank notes of foreign countries. Among them were those of Portugal, Australia, West Africa and other countries. Records for coal delivered to an address on Sherbrooke street, Winnipeg, were also disclosed.

Chief of Detectives Lepage said to-day that he had received word from a number of Ontario towns where robberies had been committed during the past few months, that the officials of these towns and cities, from the description furnished him by the Montreal police, were of the opinion that Ryan and his alleged confederate, O'Hara, now held, were also suspected of having been implicated in these other crimes.

MAY ERECT FIRST HALL FOR C.S.E.T.

Five Churches May Build Joint Recreational Center

SUPPLEMENT Y. M. C. A. London South Churches May Enter New Field

Reports presented to a special committee of Askin Street Methodist Church charged with investigating the need of greater accommodation for religious education in that church showed that one young men's class had grown so large, together with crowding in other Sunday school departments, that no more members might be accepted. Representatives of the young men's Bible class stated they could double their present membership of 50 within a week if accommodation were provided.

Reports submitted showed that in 10 classes of "teen-age" boys and girls over 400 were enrolled, and that the securing of 10 additional classrooms at once was imperatively needed. These reports will come before the Askin street quarterly board meeting for discussion early in November. It is believed that plans will be laid for considerable addition to the church building, which will not include additional classrooms, but will provide well-equipped gymnasium and other recreational rooms.

Some of the young people's classes have signified their desire to help in financing the building plans. The Epworth League stating that they have \$400 already subscribed. This action on the part of the young people is expected to give a lead to the senior members.

ASKIN STREET REPORT. The recreational needs of young people in churches and the churches' responsibility in the matter was dwelt on with peculiar emphasis at the meeting. It is believed that a plan is forming in South London whereby the largest of the churches there may unite in erecting a union C. S. E. T. building, the first of its kind in Canada.

While the C. S. E. T. work is a part of the Y. M. C. A. activities, having been initiated by that organization, it is believed that its growth in London, evangelical churches will soon emphasize the need of church union at least for young people's recreation.

It is pointed out that the central Y. M. C. A. cannot begin to care for all the C. S. E. T. groups, and that churches will have to take the initiative in providing district institutions if this special work is to be extended as its growth seems to demand, it said.

The five South London churches that may join together for a union recreational building are Askin Street Methodist, Knox Presbyterian, Ridout Street Methodist, St. James' Anglican and Wortley Road Baptist Church.
