NOTE AND COMMENT.

Peterborough Examiner.—Put them down—under the ground—telegraph, telephone and electric wires of all kinds. It is the only way that will prevent the agency of the greatest public utility from being a gigantic nuisance in the way of obstruction of the streets, a menace of fires and a danger to life.

In order to encourage a flourishing Michigan industry the legislature has reduced the trial fee of divorce cases. It used to be \$7 for a contested case, now it is \$3. A pro confesso case which used to cost \$4 now costs only \$2. The fee for starting a divorce suit has also been reduced, from \$5 to \$3. Result—one divorce to every eight marriages in Wayne county and the ratio steadily growing.

Striking Evidence of Canadian progress is shown in the customs returns for the year just closed. For the nine months of the past fiscal year \$85,296,039.00 were collected, compared with \$63,670,058.00 for the corresponding year ending December 31, 1911. This gives an increase of \$21,625,981.00, which is a remarkable evidence of the wave of prosperity which is now sweeping Canada. At the present rate of progress the revenue from customs alone for the

fiscal year ending March 31 next, will be in the neighborhood of \$115,000,000.00, or, in round figures, an increase over the last fiscal year of \$25,000,000.00. For the month of December the customs receipts for the Dominion were \$8,770,255.00, an increase over the corresponding month of 1911 of \$1,436,906.

Ontario spent for colonization roads last year about \$850,000, and on bridges about \$250,000. Local municipalities spent about 1,110,000 days of statute labor, and \$1,400,000 in cash. The advisability of doing away with statute labor altogether has been frequently urged, yet a great many municipalities stick to it. In 1911 the expenditure under the highway improvement act was 711,000, of which the province contributed one-third.

The International Peace Committee having in charge the matter of arranging a suitable peace memorial to mark the one hundredth anniversary of peace among English-speaking peoples, has presented a lengthy report in which, among other things, they suggest that a tunnel be constructed from Windsor to Detroit for public use. The committee recommends strongly that the Canadian-American frontier and border cities be beneficiaries of a permanent memorial. The "Year Book" issued by the national committee outlines an extensive scheme of international boulevards, parks and driveways, with a tunnel under the Detroit River for the use of the public. In speaking of the suggestion that there be international co-operation to put through the plan, the book suggests "That there be erected at such of the local points as the Niagara frontier and the Detroit frontier, permanent monuments, such as water gates, on either side of the Detroit River and border monuments along the United States-Canada frontier of 3,840 miles."

In Ontario the average yield of fall

wheat per acre was 19.8. Brant county produced the lowest average per acre, 12.4, and Rainy River and Kenora the highest, 33.4.

Decision on a Will.

When Mrs. Jane McGill, a widow, of Ekfrid Township, Middlesex County, died last January, she divided by her will a small estate among her six daughters. To five of them she left small sums totalling \$130, but to her daughter, Margaret, she left \$645. In it is said that this was done because the mother thought she could not get along as well as the other girls. At any rate the bequest to Margaret was guarded by a provision that the executors should retain control of the principal and pay to Margaret the interest until such time as she could use the bequest "providently and well." The executors presumed to act in accordance with the terms of the will and refused to pay over the principal to Miss Margaret. Having become 21 years of age, Miss Margaret brought suit to recover her legacy from the full amount, which is now \$869.52. Justice Kelley, of Toronto, gave judgment at Osgoode Hall in the young lady's favor. He

G. S. Pitkin has been elected chairman of the Petrolea Water Commission six consecutive years.

For keeping the bars open on election day, the proprietors of three hotels at Dunnville were each fined \$50.

Strathroy hotel keepers will adopt a new schedule of rates for meals and board and prices will be materially increased.

G. Farr, Petrolea, was fined \$50 and costs for selling liquor on Christmas Day and \$10 and cost for selling to a minor.

The treasurer of the Forest Agricultural Society received this week a cheque for \$108.75, from the Dominion Government, being the amount, with interest, which the Society expended on its new building in 1911.

The body of the late Bruce Rodgers, the Kerwood boy, who was accidentally drowned in the wilds of Northern Ontario last fall, was brought home for interment on Saturday, the funeral taking place from Tanton's parlors to Strathroy cemetery. Rev. Mr. Kannawin officiated and the casket was carried to its last resting place by Messrs. Smith, Fuller, Pole, Denning, Fisher and de Gex. The body was recovered from the water shortly after the accident and temporarily buried near the scene of the fatality—said to be more than a week's journey from the nearest railway—until instructions could be secured from his parents.—Strathroy Age.
