




NO. 1 TEAM.

Ottawa, July 5. - Revenue and expenditure Ottawa, July 5. — Revenue and expenditure statement for the fiscal year just closed was issued to-day. The total revenue for the 12 months was \$33,119,455 and expenditure \$31,228,872, leaving a nominal surplus of \$1,890,612. It should be mentioned, how-ever, that this does not represent the actual surplus of the year, as the accounts will not be finally closed for about two months yet. The expenditure on capital account shows a reduction of over \$1,000,000 this year as compared with 1894. The decrease of debt last month was \$573,000.

Accident to the Prince Rupert.

The D. A. R. company's steamer Prince Pupert met with an accident at St. John on Wednesday which will cause considerable delay before she is again fit for the Bay route. She made her first regular trip to Digby in the morning, and reached St. John again on time. Just as she started to swing out from the pier for Digby her high pressure cylinder cracked. The cause of the accident is said to be due to some cold water being in the cylinder, which on encountering the steam caused the crack. There is a general feeling of regret at the mishap.
