SEVEN PLAIN REASONS.

Amongst these might be mentioned at least two such works published in America, which, we fancy, must be having great influence for good in a large many to the Church of America, and their system of Sunday-school teaching cannot fail to do great things for the coming generation. We must, however, place the work by Mr. Oldham amongst the very best of the many works on this subject that have been published. It is a convincing work, and done in a right and manly Christian spirit. We greatly desire that thoughtful religious Dissenters would study it, and would try, as they read it, to answer it. We wish that the truth only may prevail, and we are sure that it will not prevail through the Church being other than Christ intended it. Our spirit and heart and actual exhibit before the world. BURMAN'S PARISH INDEX.

THE INTERESTS OF THE

CHURCH would be greatly advanced if her clergy would adopt a simple system of in-er-parochial notification when adherents remove from one parish to another, and would also compile a Record of his parish for the use of a future incumbent.

Clergymen and others engaged in pastoral work and visitation are familiar with the need of some practical method of recording, in convenient and permanent form, the names of their parishioners, so as to have instant access to details, both as to unmarried persons and families, with particulars as to each member of every household.

The Index above named, prepared by the Rev. W. A. Burman, of Winnipeg, admirably supplies the want. It is for use as a directory, and consists of sheets, perforated and arranged in a Shannon Index filing case, and printed to facilitate the tabulation of all necessary information regarding the members of each family (a sheet for a family); spaces being left on the sheets for recording pastoral visits and facts regarding Age, Baptisms, Confirmations, Communications, etc., and other particulars as may be desirable to note for your use.

A Clipper Code accompanies every Index for the purpose of facilitating the noting of memoranda which would otherwise be too lengthy for entry.

When a family removes to another parish, the respective sheet may be taken off (a duplicate made) and forwarded to the clergyman of the parish to which the family goes. The sheets therefore, answer admirably as letters of communication, and convey all necessary information regarding this family to the incumbent, who will be greatly assisted, while at the same time the Church is safeguarded against loss of members.

When an incumbent removes from the parish, the Index should be left for the use of the new incumbent.

Being on a file of this pattern new sheets may be inserted at any time in their proper places, alphabetically, or sheets removed when necessary.

It is also made in pocket form as described below.

BURMAN'S PARISH POCKET INDEX.

This is a book of convenient carrying size having its leaves ruled and printed the same as the Parish Index before described. [For both families and unmarried persons] and having the leaves indexed and paged. Pages are left at the end of the book for the entry of special parish events and also for recording Sermons, addresses, etc.
