Question No. 103—Mr. Allard:

Does the government subsidize the Canadian Fisheries Council and, if so (a) for how many years (b) through what department (c) what amounts were granted in 1971, 1972 and 1973 (d) did the government make a grant as capital for the Council at the time it was created or at some later stage of its development?

Mr. Len Marchand (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of the Environment): Yes. The government pays the expenses associated with meetings of the Canadian Fisheries Advisory Council (a) since October, 1971; (b) through the Department of the Environment; (c) 1971—\$3,316.34, 1972—\$21,395.00, 1973—\$29,176.86; (d) no.

INDIAN RESERVES—ROAD MAINTENANCE

Question No. 258—Mr. Nystrom:

1. With respect to the Indian Reserves (a) Pepeekeesis (b) Okanese (c) Star Blanket (d) Little Bear (e) Standing Buffalo (f) Pasqua (g) Muscowpetung (h) Piapot (i) Gordon (j) Muskowekwan (k) Poorman (l) Day Star (m) Fishing Lake (n) Sakimay (o) Cowesses (p) Ochapowace (q) Cote (r) the Reserve north of Cote (s) Key, what road maintenance equipment is available for roads?

2. On what dates were roads maintained on each of these Reserves from April 1 to September 30, 1974?

3. Has any of the equipment mentioned in answer to Part 1 been inoperative and, if so (a) for what period of time (b) for what reason (c) on what date is it expected that this equipment will be operative?

Mrs. Iona Campagnolo (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1. For the Indian Reserves of Pepeekeesis, Okanese, Star Blanket, Little Black Bear, Standing Buffalo, Pasqua, Muscowpetung, Piapot, Gordon, Muskowekwan, Poorman, Day Star and Fishing Lake there are 3 motor graders available to maintain roads. The Reserves Sakimay, Cowesses and Ochapowace each have their own graders while Cote, Key and Keeseekoose Reserves contract out their road maintenance.

2. There is no date breakdown listed for individual reserves except for: Gordon, April 19, 23, 30, August 14, 15; Poorman, April 24; Day Star, April 26, August 13; Muskowekwan, August 9, 10; Fishing Lake, August 7, 8; Standing Buffalo, September 4, 5.

For the reserves of Pepeekeesis, Okanese, Star Blanket, and Little Black Bear road work was done on April 6, 7, 8, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26; May 6, 7, 8, 9, 16, 17, 23, 25, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31; June 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 20, 21, 29; July 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 10, 12, 15, 16, 17; August 7, 8, 9, 10, 13, 17, 21, 22, 23, 26, 27; September 3, 9, 16, 18, 23.

For the reserves of Pasqua, Piapot and Muscowpetung road work was done on April 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 9, 10; June 17, 18, 19; July 23, 24, 25, 26; September 6, 26, 27.

The bands have road committees who delegate to the operator when and where roads are to be maintained.

3. One machine broke down and was traded for a reconditioned vehicle. One additional machine was inoperative for three weeks for lack of an operator and on two occasions for moldboard and transmission repairs.

CATCH OF FISH OFF COAST OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Question No. 304—Mr. Whittaker:

1. What was the total estimated catch of fish off the coast of British Columbia by all nations in 1973?

2. What percentage of this total was caught by Canadian fisherman and how does this figure compare with the estimated catch to date this year?

3. What is the estimated size of the Canadian West Coast fishing fleet and how does the size compare with that of 1968 to 1974?

4. What is the total of the low cost loans made to the British Columbia fishermen by the government?

5. What is the estimated number of people employed by fishing and the related industries in British Columbia?

6. What is the estimated percentage of unemployed in this industry?

Mr. Len Marchand (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of the Environment): 1. As the 1973 data is not completed, this information cannot be supplied at this time.

2. As noted above, this question is partly unanswerable. Canadian catch to: October 6, 1973, 354,541 (x 100 lb.); October 5, 1974, 302,494 (x 1000 lb.).

3. Canadian west coast fishing fleet.
