1. That a person named Otto Nittinen, who arrived at Quebec on the 5th of November, 1908, by the *Empress of Ireland*, was afflicted with leprosy?
2. That the leper in question was placed in the Immigration Hospital at Quebec and left in contact with the ordinary patients?
3. That on the 25th November, 1908, the said Otto Rittinen was re-embarked on board one of the vessels of the Pacific Company, the *Montreal*, going to Anvers?
4. That the journey from the Immigration Hospital to the vessel was made by the leper in the ordinary vehicle of the hospital in company with two other immigrants?
5. That at the time of his arrival in Quebec, this Otto Rittinen had been declared afflicted with leprosy by Doctor Baily, of the American Commission?
6. That the certificate given by Doctor Pagé, of Quebec, for the forced repatriation of this immigrant attests that he was suffering from leprosy?
