My dear Sir Robert,

I have your letter of last Friday with reference to Mr. Kellogg and the Nobel Peace Prize.

It is true that

Kellogg received an honorary degree from Mc-Gill. This was in 1913 on an accasion when the American Bar Association met in Montreal. At that time a number of honorary degrees were conferred by the University on distinguished members of that Association.

I have decided (and in this I am supported by the Corporation of the University) not to press upon the Nobel Peace Prize Committee any claims which Mr. Kellogg's friends think he has.- I am afraid this all comes as rather a rude shock to me. I was not aware that any wire-pulling was necessary in connection with such things as the Nobel Prizes. It savours a little of experiences I had in the War, when friends of officers sometimes asked that military decorations be awarded.
