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lation to the war which concerns the King of Prus-
sia, the Allies of his Most Christian Majesty are de-
termined to treat with the same openness and sinceri-
ty as the Court of France, and that they will bring
with them, to the Negotiation at the future Con-
gress, all the acquiescence which their unanimity dic-
tates for the general good of Europe.

I must add, that with regard to the war which
concerns the King of Prussia, as well as with respect
to the other Allies of the King my Master, his Ma-
jesty, always constant in fulfilling the engagements
of his crown with the most scrupulous exactness, can
never fail to support their respective interests, whe-
ther in the course of the Negotiation, (which may
God prosper), or in the continuance of the war, (if
contrary to all expectation this misfortune should be
unavoidable), with the cordiality and efficacy of a sin-
cere and faithful Ally.

As to what remains, it is superfluous to mention
to what degree his Majesty wishes for this speedy es-
tablishment of the general peace in Germany, after
the distinguished proof his Majesty has given, in so
readily contenting to the proposition of so distant a
place as the town of Augsburg for the meeting of
the Congress.

Such are the sincere and upright intentions of the
King my Master for the re-establishment of the pu-
blic tranquillity. I think myself happy in having
the charge of conveying such sentiments, and of ha-
ving an opportunity of assuring your Excellency of
the distinguished regard with which I have the honour
to be, &c.
