

CARS NOW RUNNING ON ST. CLAIR LINE TO COMPLETE LINE BY NEXT CHRISTMAS

Seventy-Six Passengers Enjoyed First Trip on Civic Trolley.

At last St. Clair avenue car lines are making that district look like a permanent part of the city. The cars commenced operation at daylight yesterday, and will be on the job henceforth.

The Canadian Northern Railway officials yesterday received positive and definite information from the contractor that the line between Sudbury and Port Arthur, a distance of 400 miles, will be completed and ready for operation by Christmas.

The recent enlargement of the C. N. R. elevators at Port Arthur, bringing their capacity up to the ten million bushel mark, was undertaken in order that the elevators might be ready when the steel was laid. With the rolling stock have lately been given in fact, a prominent official of the C. N. R. told The World yesterday that never in the history of the road had construction been proceeding at the same rapid pace.
