

STEPHEN RYDER.—An ensign in the Third Battalion December 20th, 1781.

GEORGE RYERSON.—Ensign in the Fourth Battalion in 1778.

JOHN SEAMON.—Commissioned an ensign in the Third Battalion in 1779, but remained in service but one year.

JAMES SERVICE.—An ensign in the Sixth Battalion in 1778.

JOHN SHANNON was commissioned an ensign in the Second Battalion September 10th, 1778, and remained as such until the close of the war.

PHILIP KEARNEY SKINNER.—A resident of Perth Amboy, New Jersey. He was a son of General Skinner. He was commissioned by his father as ensign in the First Battalion November 10th, 1781. He was, after the war, placed in the British line—the Twenty-Third Regiment of Foot—and after various promotions he became, in 1825, lieutenant-general of the British army. The following year, April 9th, 1826, he died in London.

JOHN SWANTON was an ensign in the Third Battalion in 1778 and until 1782, when we find him in the same office in the Second Battalion.

LEWIS THOMPSON was commissioned an ensign in the Second Battalion December 19th, 1781.
