But amidft all his tendernefs and fondnefs for his children, he endeavors to confine his lamentations to the fame period with the child's life: This he does from a confideration that all his tears and lamentations could not in the leaft avail towards reftoring the deceafed infant to his natural life—that the child had but gone before him to his final home—that the deceafed could not return, but the father mult follow him, to the place appointed for all living—mult foon enter that war, from which there is no difcharge.

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SINCE David, the illustrious faint and fervant of God, made this maxim, an argument for preventing violent grief and lamentation, it is very proper that we should give attention to it, and fuffer it to have great weight with us, when we find ourfelves inclined to despair, to discouragement, or to extravagant grief under the chaftifements of our heavenly father's hand.

MANKIND cannot abfolutely and univerfally rule their paffions, fuch as hope; fear, joy, grief and the like; but fome controul and command of these paffions lies within our power, yea much more than is generally imagined. We find upon trial, that it is (to a confiderable degree) in our power to increase or diminish, our 'elief or difbelief of a proposition ; to magnify or to leffen our hope of a benefit, or fear of an evil : In like manner we find ourfelves able (beyond what is commonly fuppofed) to increase our joy upon prosperity, and our grief under adverfity. Upon this principle David undertook to regulate his mourning, to moderate his grief at the lofs of his fon. He confidered the impoffibility of bringing back his fon from the dark and filent grave : and he endeavored to let reason predominate over his paffion, to regulate his conduct by the principles of a found understanding : He argues with hunfelf-like a rational creature, and like a true child of God. If we under the fame affliction, imitate the bright pattern of king David, we shall perform our duty to our God and to ourfelves : we shall escape much needlefs diffrefs and unavailing vexation; we shall act more confistent with our own reason, more agree ture.
