

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—(Special)—The Canadian Northern Ontario Railway will apply to parliament for an extension of time in completing the lines from Toronto to Ottawa, French River to Ottawa and Montreal to Sudbury to the C. N. R. The company also seeks authority to build from Long Lake to the Nation, Transcontinental, and from a point in the Township of Chisholm to a point on the Central Ontario line.
