

FOR THE PICNIC BASKET.

To make superior sandwich butter, weight here.

To make superior sandwich butter, weigh half a pound of butter and beat weigh half a pound of butter and beat it in a basin with a clean, dry, wooden spoon until soft. Then add by degrees half a cupful of whipped cream, sufficient salt and mustard to taste, and place it in a cool place until required. This butter is considered a great improvement for buttering sandwiches, as it is more convenient for spreading, and the sandwiches taste far better than those made with ordinary butter. Another method is to cream sweet butter and mix with it either one of the following ingredients (proportions being one teaspoonful to every six tablespoonfuls of butter); grated horseradish, finely chopped parsley, curry paste or powder, anchovy paste, bloater paste, or red pepper. These will be found decidedly good for sand-wiches.

Rolled Sandwiches.

Pound six ounces of cooked ham or tongue till smooth, then add two table-spoonfuls of butter and a little pepper. Spread on thin slices of slightly buttered bread. Mix the puree above prepared with two tablespoonfuls of mayonnaise sauce, and spread the buttered side with this. Roll up firmly each
