ALLIES WILL STRIKE AT CONSTANTINOPLE

Gen. D'Esperey Declares They Will Soon Throw Turks Into Asia. Franchet d'Esperey, the allied commander-in-chief on the Macedonia front, in replying to a demonstration today.

NEW PEACE MOVE FROM HUNGARIANS

Delegation of Statesmen at Vienna Ready to Open Negotiations. Amsterdam, Oct. 4.—A delegation of Hungarian statesmen, headed by Premier Wekerle, arrived at Vienna in connection with a peace move, according to The Cologne Gazette.

THREE MONTHS' CLOSING OF SPORTING CLUBS

Country, Yacht, Golf and Canoe Clubs Muet Aid in Conservation of Fuel. Ottawa, Oct. 4.—Regulations to restrict the fuel consumption of private country clubs, golf, yacht and canoe clubs, have just been approved by order-in-council, at the instance of Mr. C. A. Magrath, fuel controller.

German Retreat May Soon Become a Rout

Hurried Preparations Made to Evacuate Dune Country of Belgium—Citizens Moved from Courtrai. London, Oct. 4.—There is every indication, according to authoritative naval sources, of an early abandonment by the Germans of the entire Flanders coast. The Germans already are removing their guns. The Belgian coast has been under a heavy bombardment for the past two days.

TURKEY WILL HOLD OUT UNTIL LAST MOMENT

Geneva, Oct. 4.—Essad Pasha, the provisional president of Albania, and former commander of the Turkish forces at Scutari, in an interview before his departure for Salonica, declared that Turkey would hold out to the last minute before capitulating, would receive better terms from the entente allies.

HOLLAND SENDS OUT PEACE INVITATIONS

Amsterdam, Oct. 4.—Austria-Hungary has requested Holland to invite the belligerents to take part in peace negotiations, says the Vienna correspondent of The Berlin Tageblatt. The correspondent adds that Holland already has sent out the invitations.

ENEMY BEGINS TO FEEL HEAVY LOSSES IN GUNS

London, Oct. 4.—The American casualties in the heavy fighting in the Argonne region are described as moderate. The Germans have been unable to maintain their unusual artillery fire and are undoubtedly beginning to feel the loss of the large number of guns captured from them recently all along the western front.

GREEK TROOPS PRESS AFTER BULGARIANS

Paris, Oct. 4.—Greek troops are trying to press into Greek Macedonia, following up the Bulgarian evacuation. They entered Seres this morning and have occupied the Demir-Hissar Pass. The Bulgarian retreat is being conducted according to the armistice agreement.

ITALIANS MAKE ENEMY WITHDRAW A LITTLE

Rome, Oct. 4.—The communication from the war office today says: "In the Valle delle Aderni, near Castro, and on the western buttresses of Mount Scazzolo, we forced the enemy to withdraw from advanced positions, leaving dead and prisoners."

FRENCH WITHDRAW FROM CHALLENGE

Paris, Oct. 4.—The French official communication issued tonight says: "In Champagne the French and American troops in the course of the day completed their advantages of yesterday. On our left, we pushed on our lines four kilometers north of Auberville, and eight kilometers northwest of Somme-Py as far as the Arnes River."

WAR PRICES COMING DOWN

Speculative prices of commodities, if not actual cash transactions, are gradually adjusting themselves to the war conditions, with an early prospect of peace. As in the stock market, so on the grain exchange, traders are trying to guess just what effect the conclusion of peace will mean. From the drop in grain prices on the Chicago market, outside of wheat, which has a set government price, it would seem that a considerable fall in actual prices is expected.

ANOTHER VICTORY WON BY BRITISH IN AFRICA

Paris, Oct. 4.—Portuguese forces in Africa, in conjunction with the British, have driven the remaining German troops in German East Africa back across the Rovuma River, according to The Petit Parisien. The Rovuma runs from the region of Lake Nyassa to the Indian Ocean, and forms the boundary line between German and Portuguese East Africa.

CEZIMBRA IS SHELLED BY TWO GERMAN SUBS.

Lisbon, Oct. 4.—Two enemy submarines today shelled the port of Cezimbra, 18 miles south of Lisbon. The shore guns immediately replied, whereupon the submarines fled.

KING OF BULGARIANS HAS ABDICATED THRONE

Paris, Oct. 4.—King Ferdinand of Bulgaria is reported to have abdicated in favor of Crown Prince Boris, who has already assumed power, according to a Bled despatch to the Hovas Agency, quoting advices from Vienna.

OBSCURE LEADER MURDERED BY ROBBERS

London, Oct. 4.—Alexander J. Guchkoff, former Russian minister of war and leader of the Octoberist party, has been murdered by robbers. This information was received today by the Central News in a despatch from Amsterdam, quoting Moscow advices.
