

The loss of the average crop value of the past five years was \$2.75 per acre, or 300 millions of dollars for all the arable land. The average land value per acre in 1884 was \$36; in 1894, \$26, a falling of \$10 per acre in 10 years, or a total fall-off of \$100,000,000. The increase of mortgage indebtedness in the past 10 years was \$200,000,000; add to this the decrease of farm values in 10 years except county judges. 
