HAYFORKING THE PUBLIC.
What Hardy will do next is always a conundrum. The only thing that can be safely predicted is that the late Conservative Government never attempted anything in this line quite so outrageous. Hardy's sin consists in this, that in making these appointments he has acted in direct opposition to an act of his own Legislature, and in direct opposition to the high moral standard set down by the Liberal party when the Conservative Government some years ago appointed a big batch of C.'s. On that occasion the Provincial Liberals raised a great cry and in virtue of their indignation against the system of making these appointments wholesale, Mr. Hardy did not act in conformity with the appointments. The act is Chap. 173, K.S. Section 7 reads as follows:

"From and after the time when this section comes into force, no appointment of Her Majesty's counsel learned in the law shall be made by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council beyond the number of any in any one year, or twenty in any four years. Sub-section 4 of the same section provides that the act respecting the Appointment of Queen's Counsel shall not become operative until it has been proclaimed by the Lieutenant-Governor. The act was passed in 1897, but it has not yet been proclaimed. The act is on the statute book, but it is not law. Hardy is at his old hazy game. He is selling the public good bricks. He is flim-flamming the people. He passed an act in 1897 the better to emphasize his opposition to the practice of appointing the members of the legal profession by making indiscriminate appointments as Queen's Counsel. But the act had a string to it. Hardy now pulls the string and the act vanishes out of sight. Having pulled the string Hardy is at liberty to make as many appointments as he pleases. And consequently the late Conservative Government, no Conservative premier ever put out such a list of C.'s as was announced in The Globe yesterday. In 1897 the Government thought five C.'s was as many as could be decently created in one year, or twenty in four years. Two years have elapsed since 1897. This would make the number of C.'s appointed six. And yet an act limiting the number to ten for this year is in existence and is printed in cold type as the law of the land.

THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT.
If there is any intention in official circles to place a British officer at the head of the proposed Canadian regiment for South Africa, the sooner the idea is abandoned the better.

Following in this line is acting in a very unbecoming manner, and the British Government ought to accept our offer just as we make it. There is no scarcity in Canada of men who are able to command the proposed regiment. We would not be doing justice to ourselves to allow an attempt to command the Canadian corps to be made by a man who is not a Canadian. What will be thought of Canada if it goes abroad that we, with our military schools and militia corps, cannot produce an officer capable of commanding a few hundred men? The idea of placing a British officer at the head of the Canadian regiment is absurd. It should not for a moment be entertained.

CANADA HAS ZINC, TOO.
In another column we reproduce extracts from an article in the October Cosmopolitan, describing the zinc mines of the Joplin, Mo., district. The development of zinc mining in recent years has been phenomenal, as this article will show. Zinc is a very scarce metal, while the demand for it is extending rapidly. There seems to be no limit to the extent or variety of Canada's mineral resources.

A PROPOSED IMPERIAL CURRENCY.
A writer in The Canadian Magazine for October makes a suggestion on Imperial currency that is worthy of consideration. The idea is to assimilate the currencies of the British Empire, by adopting the English £ as our standard and calling it \$5.00. The author, Mr. W. Myers Gray, thus explains his system:

Seeing that a dollar is nothing more than a name for a small coin, why should we not assume our Currency Act as to make the English pound the standard unit, or, as we call it, "five dollars"? If we did, nobody would be hurt, no money would be lost, and all our subsidiary coins would be in sterling money, instead of being apparently although not intrinsically, worthless.

We could then establish a mint and strike of gold coins for £2, equal to \$10.00, and £1, equal to \$5.00, having both denominations in silver coins, also silver coins equal to four shillings, or \$1.00. We would then not only be independent of our neighbors to the south, but we would be the pioneers in adopting the coming "Imperial Currency of Greater Britain."

All the British Government has to do to abolish the "cartwheel" penny, and the shilling, and to issue £2 and £1 coins, instead of 24 of them shall go to a shilling, and then all the coins of the realm would be in sterling money, and the English people, with the two denominations on them, will find that it will not be long before the English people will be keeping the shilling in condition and good use instead of three denominations, involving endless calculations in bringing peace into the country.

If Great Britain and Canada alone were to be considered in this matter, there would appear to be no reason why we should not adopt Mr. Gray's suggestion. It is our close personal relationship with the United States more than anything else that will prevent the introduction of the system. Our business with the mother country, however, is increasing so rapidly that it is a question if it would not pay us to accept the pound coinage with that of Great Britain, even if considerable inconvenience in our dealings with the United States should ensue.
