The Imperial party proceeded without further incident. There was great excitement for a time near the palace grounds. The case has been taken up by the German consul at Yokohama and representations will probably be made by him. No punishment is looked for in the case, but the man will probably be deported.

Helena, Mont., Dec. 31.—A definite plan of action to defeat the proposed consolidation of the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Burlington Railway systems was unanimously agreed upon to-day by the governors and attorney-generals of seven northwestern states in which these roads have mileage. Legal action will be instituted immediately in Minnesota courts with this object in view, and to quote Attorney-General Douglas of Minnesota, "The thing will be fought to a finish." Just how, when or where these suits will be brought, neither Van Sant of Minnesota nor Attorney-General Douglas would state. The conference adjourned late this evening after adopting resolutions condemning the proposed merger as contrary to sound public policy, and pledging support to any proper legal action which may be brought to test its validity. Other resolutions adopted call on Congress to investigate the subject and favor the granting of power to the inter-state commerce commission to fix maximum rates upon inter-state business.


