### TO UNITE IN MISSION WORK.

Important Conference of Various Evangelical Denominations Held.

An important conference was held on Thursday night at the residence of Principal Caven of Knox College, when a movement was inaugurated, which will have far-reaching results concerning the labors of the various evangelical denominations in the foreign and domestic missions fields. Representatives were present from the various denominations. It was felt that there was much overlapping of work and consequent waste of energy; that in many instances, there were several church bodies working together in one field, where one could as well do the work, and, in other instances, there was a lack of co-operation in the work, and united action among the churches, this overlapping would occur, and better results would be obtained.

Thursday night's meeting was of a private nature, to get the idea into shape. There was unanimity of opinion that some definite action should be taken, and a committee, composed of Rev. Principal Caven, convener, Principal Sherrington, Wycliffe College, Prof. James Ballantyne, Knox College, Rev. F. C. Heathcote and Rev. Dr. Chown, was appointed to prepare a memorial to be presented to the various churches, asking them to take such steps as will promote co-operation, especially in the home and foreign mission fields, and in the prevention of overlapping, and the consequent waste of men and means.

### MOVED HER FIFTY FEET.

New Steamer Montreal Was Shoved Back on the Blocks.

It had been decided to launch the new Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Co.'s steamer, Montreal, at the Bertman Shipyards on Monday, Feb. 3, at 3 o'clock p.m. A fifty-foot water-tight compartment on the extreme bow of the vessel had been attached. In doing so, it was found necessary to move the vessel astern about 50 feet, which was done with comparatively little difficulty, owing to the complete arrangements made for the task. The vessel was then moved, weighed about 500 tons.

**Oldest in the State.** Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 24.—Mrs. Ruth Carney, aged 108 years, is dead at the Union Home for Old Ladies here. She was reputed to be the oldest woman in Pennsylvania. She was born in Wales, but passed the greater part of her life in this country.

## NO REFORMS THIS SESSION

Attorney-General Says No Legislation Dealing With Law Reform Will Be Introduced.

### CANADIAN FLAX MAY BE USED

It Suitable, in the Manufacture of Binder Twine and Rope.

The inquisitive members of the legislature had their innings yesterday afternoon, and the greater part of the session was taken up with the replies from Ministers to their questions.

Mr. Breithaupt inquired if the government had considered the question of utilizing Canadian-grown flax in the manufacture of binder twine and rope, instead of procuring the raw material from foreign countries.

The Provincial Secretary replied that \$5000 would be placed in the supplementary estimates for the purpose of experimenting in connection with the matter.

**That Windsor Case.** Mr. Whitney asked, has an injunction been served on the sheriff of the County of Essex, forbidding him to interfere with the pipes of a gas company conveying gas from Essex County to the city of Detroit, and, if so, what is the name of the company? The company's lease was cancelled on October 28, 1901.

### PRACTICAL PUBLIC OWNERSHIP.

Orillia Operates Its Own Electric Lighting Since Thursday.

Orillia, Jan. 24.—Thursday night the town of Orillia was lighted by power from Ragged Rapids, on the Severn River, nineteen miles distant. The town's electric transmission plant is almost completed, and in the trial test worked satisfactorily. Two years ago the contract for the installation of the plant was given to the Electrical Maintenance and Construction Company of Toronto. The cost of the plant will be about \$125,000. The town will be supplied with 750 horse power for two turbine wheels and generators. The plant will supply light and power at very low rates. The plant is owned and will be operated by the municipality.

### Y.M.C.A. CONVENTION.

Berlin, Jan. 24.—There was a large attendance at the convention this morning, and good progress was made in the hearing of reports.

Mr. D. A. Budge of Montreal spoke on "The Education of a Community," pointing out the invaluable services of the Y.M.C.A. work towards this end.

The report of the Educational Department of the International Y.M.C.A. Committee was read and adopted. Mr. R. Kilgour of Toronto reported on the association's work in military camps, and it was brought out that the last conference for South Africa was well supplied with Christian literature, leaving Halifax. This afternoon with a Bible study lesson, after which an open parliament was held.

### HOW SMALLPOX SPREADS.

Hagersville, Jan. 24.—The Health Officer of Walpole Township, Haldimand County, writing in regard to the recent death from malignant smallpox of that of a blacksmith who had been employed in a lumber camp, stayed at a Jarvis hotel, and was quarantined with the hotelkeeper and his wife. The quarantined employee, in the hotel went home, and later developed smallpox, as did also his sister. In the latter case the disease was diagnosed as chickenpox, but people who came in contact with the patient developed smallpox. In this way the disease spread thru Rainham and in townships in the county. In one of the families, who is a Christian Scientist, refused to allow himself to be vaccinated. Smaller children of the unvaccinated members of the family, but those vaccinated escaped, although living in the same house.

### CITY AND COUNTRY GROWTH.

More Census Figures on Population of Ontario and Manitoba.

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—A bulletin was issued this morning giving the rural and urban population of the Provinces of Ontario and Manitoba, by census districts, as enumerated at the last census in 1891. Compared with the same classes of population in 1881.

In Ontario during the last decade there has been a falling off of 48,133 in the rural population, and an increase of 1,247,190, as against 1,205,000 in 1881. On the other hand, the urban population has increased by 116,754. This shows the extent to which the population in the rural districts has been drifting to the cities.

In Manitoba, however, the case is somewhat different. In that province there has been a falling off in both classes of the population. The rural population has grown from 118,498 in 1881 to 134,714 at the last census, a gain of 73,216. The urban population, which was 41,000 in 1881, now stands at 70,233, a growth of 29,233.
