HAILSTONES LIKE APPLES

Severe Storm in Kent County Does Great Damage to Crops.

Chatham, Ont., July 12.-About 5:45 yesterday afternoon a severe hail-storm passed north of this city over Chatham township. Between the 4th and 6th concessions the force of the storm was greatest. About six inches of hail fell there, doing untold damage to crops and fruit. Some of the stones were as large as apples. All the barley and fall wheat that had not been cut was literally threshed out. The orchards also suffered, and the trees in the track of the storm were

stripped of their fruit.

The loss cannot be estimated just now, but the great majority of the farmers will lose their entire crop, and may be ruined by the terrible storm. Some heads of wheat and barley were brought to this city, and they are empty of grain, being crushed worse than if with a flail.

FIVE WILL DIE

The severely injured are: Harris Basek, express man; his five children—Becky, aged 17, Pauline, aged 15, Hannah, aged 14, Katie, aged 2, and Ada, 8 days; Harris Silver, tailor; Tillie Silver, aged 4 years

The fire started in the apartments of Max Press, a coat operator who lived with his family and a boarder named Jacob Kaplan, on the fourth floor. There were sixteen families in the house. It cannot be determined just how the fire started. Press admits that he went to bed, leaving the lamp burning, and that he and his boarder, Kaplan, were smoking cigarettes, and the firemen believe that the men must have gone to sleep with lighted cigarettes in their mouths and fired the bedding. Press's hair was singed by the flames.
