Brown Will Hang

Dominion Government Will Not Commute the Death Sentence.

The Peg-Leg Will Epxi- tramp of the railway watchman Ross, without the slightest provession. This ate His Crime on the Gallows.

Will Be Hanged Here on Wednesday Morning.

The Minister of Justice Carefully Scanned the Facts-The Prisoner Has Been Fairly Treated-The Circumstances Reviewed.

It is announced from Ottawa that the Government of the Dominion, after carefully considering the facts of the case, on Saturday agreed to recommend to his Excellency that no executive action be taken in the case of Marion Brown, now under sentence of death here for the murder of Police Constable Toohey. The condemned man will accordingly explate his crime on the scaffold on Wednesday morning

This is a case that has occupied good deal of attention. At the trial, the prisoner made his defense on the plea that it was a case of mistaken identity-that some other man with a wooden leg, and not he, was the slayer of Policeman Toohey-that he was hundress of miles away from the scene of the crime on the eventful evening last June when poor Toohey was shot down in the execution of his duty. The evidence, however, was as conclusive as circumstantial evidence could be that Brown was the murderer, and the jury had no hesitation in saying that he was guilty of the terrible crime.

So strongly impressed were the community with the necessity of making is safe to say that up to the trial he had very few friends. He had a few, however, among thoughtful men in the community, who were inclined to think that if it were possible that he killed Policeman Toohey, because he are often treated in the South, without mercy, when they are suspected of wrong-doing-he should have been convicted of manslaughter, and sentenced to penal servitude for life. This conclusion was reached by many legal men, who took the ground that Brown should have been given the benefit of the doubt, when it was affirmed on his behalf that he shot Toohey either because he did not know he was an officer, and was afraid of his own life, when the policeman came upon him with a pistol in his hand, or imagined that he would be treated to that scant measure of justice so often extended to Southerners of his kind by those

who capture them. We believe that the Minister of Justice took all these pleas into his earnest consideration, and when he was in the city the other day, he went over the scene of the crime, and became thoroughly seized of all the surroundings. A case for the interven-tion of his Excellency has not, however, been clearly made out, though some will believe that it might have been otherwise, had the condemned man been put in the box at the trial to make a clean breast of all his do-

the life of Policeman Toohey. While there were some circumstances that led strongly to the conclusion that it may have been that Brown did not premeditate the murder of the policeman, and that he shot him because he believed his own life was in danger, and that if he were arrested justice would not be done him, there were many facts that led up to another conclusion, and it is certain that the Minister of Justice could not lose sight of them in making his recommendation to council. without the slightest provocation. This was an outrage for which there could be no excuse whatever. Ross was felled to the ground in an insensible state, merely because he performed his duty in requesting the tramp not to trespass on Grand Trunk property. As soon as he had knocked down the railway watchman, Brown cleared out, apparently under the impression that he had either killed or seriously wounded him. It was while he was flying from the spot where he had committed this crime, and

while he was fully aware that he was being pursued, that Brown was over-taken by Policeman Toohey, who was then shot down in cold blood.

When we remember that Toohey was one of the most careful officers in the police force—that he was probably the least aggressive, and not likely to resort to any measures but those fully justified-it can scarcely be contended that there was any reasonable excuse whatever for resistance, much less murder, by the tramp. Nor, apart from

the special considerations which have been urged as palliation for the crime, can it be seriously contended that the murderer had any ground for his alleged fears that he would not have fair treatment and a just trial. It is more than probable, in fact, that the main reason for Brown's crime was his anxiety to escape from the consequences of his previous rascally conduct. At the time that Toohey came upon him he did not know how serious had been his brutal and unprovoked assault on Watchman Ross. To escape arrest the prisoner assassinated the man charged with the carrying out of the law. To escape arrest, at a later day, as was sworn at the trial, this prisoner expressed his determination to kill one or more county constables if they attempted to go near him. Brown has stated that he was a mild-mannered man, and that his past offenses had

been trivial in the extreme. This may or may not have been so. We can only

in this country. It was not such as to win for him the very high opinion of anyone anxious to maintain safety of life and to preserve law and order. If the fate of this man is regarded as an invitation to persons of his stamp an example of Toohey's slayer that it to give this country a wide berth, his sad end will have a useful effect. For ourselves, we have always been anxious to have the law so made, interpretwas under the impression that he would every type. Why should any tramp, be treated as negroes and halfbreeds without visible means of support, and with no property to protect, be allowed to roam the country, with a loaded firearm? Surely a tramp so equipped ought to be sent for a very long term to the penitentiary, and if he should slay anyone before his arrest, there should be little delay in reaching the conclusion that the crime was murder, as such a one carries a loaded revolver for no other purpose than to kill whosoever interferes with him in his designs. Holding these views, while we have had no objection to full investigation being given to all the extenuating circumstances in favor of Marion Brown, we do not doubt that the decision of the advisers of his Excellency in this case is a just one, and that his fate will have a beneficial effect on such members of the tramp fraternity as may be tempted in future to Interfere with a Canadian police officer

Ottawa, May 15.-Lord Minto signed an order in council today allowing the law to take its course in the case of the motive which impelled him to take | Marion Brown, better known as Peg-Leg Brown, the London murderer, who shot and killed Policeman Tochey in the city of London. Brown will be executed on Wednesday morning, May the 17th.

HIS LAST DAY

Brown Slept Well and Seems Reconciled to His Fate.

The final preparations for the execution of Marion Brown, the murderer, are being pushed forward, and before evening the gallows upon which the doomed man is to die, will have been erected. The black flag, which will float from the staff of the court house, has been made, and Brown has been informed that there is no hope

of reprieve. Yesterday he was very much affect ed when he was told by the sheriff that the chances were against him. He felt better towards evening, when he knew that no decision had been reached. Brown slept well during the night, and when Sheriff Cameron informed him this morning that the law was to take its course, he received the news in a very matter of fact way. No ministers had visited the jail up to 12 o'clock today. Brown sent for Mr. McPhillips this morning, but it is very unlikely that anything further will be done towards obtaining a reprieve. Rev. Dr. Johnston is in Ottawa. The prisoner seems reconciled to his fate.

Sheriff Cameron yesterday received the following letter:

Serious Charge Against Charles Birdsall, of St. Thomas.

The Man Who Was Accused of Killing His Brother Six Months Ago-Con demned Murderer Tries to Escape.

Detroit, May 16 .- On April 15 a young man who gave his name as Charles Holman, of Kansas City, was arrested here. He entered the house of Mrs. Marian Adams, asked her to sit for a photograph, and then made an effort to assault her. Her cries awakened her husband, who was sleeping an another room, and he rushed out. The neighbors came to the scene, and the man made off. He was soon captured, however, and a rope was placed around his neck, but the police arrived on the scene in time to save the man judge him by his conduct while he was from lynching. It has since been learned that the prisoner is Charles Birdsall, of St. Thomas. He was identified a few days ago by a St. Thomas officer. He

is in jail awaiting trial. St. Thomas, May 16.—Birdsall, alias Holman, is a son of Mrs. Birdsall, 225 Center street. On Dec. 18, 1898, his trother Joseph, of Saginaw, Mich., a brakeman on the F. and P. M. Railway, with his wife and family, came ed and enforced, as to secure safety to life and property, and to effectively discourage visitations from lawless men of Joseph Birdsall drinking and threatening to use a hatchet on Charles and members of the family. While, it is claimed, Charles was running away from Joseph, and just at the door, the table being set for supper, he picked up a plate and threw it at Joseph. The plate struck him on the head and fractured the skull. He was removed to the Amasa Wood Hospital, where he died. An inquest was held, the jury returning a verdict that the deceased, Joseph Birdsall, came to his death by being struck by a plate thrown by his brother Charles, who, when throwing the plate, was in fear of his life.

TRIED TO ESCAPE THE GALLOWS. Winnipeg, May 16.—Gusczak, under sentence of death for murdering a family in November at Stuartburn, attempted to escape from the provincial jail on Sunday morning. He had broken his iron bedstead and used the pieces to pick bricks out of the wall, tore up the bed clothing, and got into the outer court. He was discovered after a long and exciting search, hiding in a chute leading to the prison laundry.

Quebec, May 16.-Mrs. Boute, who seventeen years ago was sentenced to be hanged for poisoning another woman at Baie St. Paul, and whose sentence was subsequently commuted to penitentiary for life, died at Kingston Penitentiary last week. Her remains were interred at Beauport. Vancouver, B. C., May 16.—Enoch Wood, an Indian, was brought to the

city from his home near Port Simpson. He is charged with manslaughter, having beaten and wounded an old tribesman named Tekquo so badly that the latter shortly afterwards died.
