HAVE SERIOUS ROW

Party Badly Split and Convention at Chatham Breaks Up in Turmoil.

Chatham, Nov. 11. - None but accredited delegates were admitted to the threepence, the bishop gave the lad a sixpence, telling him: "And with the Houses, yet in spite of this the meeting broke up in a turmoil and amid shouts from the faction of the defeated nominee for the Provincial House of "fraud," "packed," "put up job," "fake," etc., all of which were significant of strong feeling. Mr. H. S. Clements, M. P., was unanimously nominated for the Dominion, and Mr. George Sulman won the Provincial House against Mr. T. A. Smith, who was once the Conservative candidate, by 75 votes to 48. Significant of the feeling in the riding, which bids fair from present talk to set an Independent Conservative in the field, was the absence from the meeting of delegates from Wallaceburg and Blenheim, the former the home of an excandidate, Mr. J. S. Fraser, and a would-be candidate, Mayor Stonehouse. There was only one delegate named in the local Conservative organization as being present from Dover, the home of some strong Conservatives. It has been recognized for some time, and admitted by the Conservatives, that there was a split in the ranks, and as a result the executive, it is said, resolved to pack the meeting. This, at least, is the story of the Smith faction, who are now talking of an independent convention, if not an independent Conservative candidate. As a result only about half the normal number of delegates were present, and these were divided as to the fairness of the meeting with regard to the selection of the candidate. Liberal newspapermen were exclud

de, and everything possible done to shun the light of day. The Associated Press man gained admittance, however, after a lengthy parley, and on the understanding that he confine his note-taking to the nominations and officers only, excluding the discussion.

NO AMERICAN TYPE

Student of Immigration Says Europeans in U.S. Do Not Fuse.

London, Nov. 10 .- A blue book presented to Parliament yesterday gives an exhaustive report on immigration into the United States prepared by Ronald C. Lindsay, second secretary of the British embassy at Washington.

Dealing with the question of the exclusion of undesirable emigrants, Mr. Lindsay contends that it is impossible to devise a system not liable to mistake, but that the matter must be regarded from the viewpoint of an American, who has the right to prefer that several desirables should be excluded, rather than one pauper admitted. The author of the report argues that it would be fanatastic to expect the various European races in America to fuse physically. There is no such thing as an American type. Many generations must elapse before the Americans can be physiologically differentiated from Europeans to the extent, for instance, as the French are from the Germans. But an assimilation of a simpler or more superficial nature has been in progress ever since the colony was

colonized. America, however, pays a heavy price for her new citizens inasmuch as arriving as adults, the task of their elevation is all the harder. In conclusion


