TEACHERS ADVANCE
ARGUMENT FOR RISE
AT CLOSED MEETING

Press Excluded From Conference With Trustees.

COMPARISONS ARE MADE

School Staffs Point to the Increases Given Employees of City.

Arguments why London school teachers' salaries should be increased were placed before members of the board of trustees last night by a committee of teachers and others at an informal meeting in the Alexandra School. The press was excluded from the meeting, and no official statement was given after it. The teachers stated that there was no information which they believed to be correct.

It is understood that no definite request for an increase yet has been put forward, nor has it been decided what percentage of increase will be requested. The arguments presented last night were along the usual line of salaries of workers at the present time, pointing out that while other workers have obtained increased wages, the cost of living has advanced the teachers have received very little increase over the pre-war standard.

Comparisons Made.
Last night the salaries of other city officials were compared with those of teachers. The salaries of the mayor, city clerk, and other officials were shown to be higher than those of teachers. The teachers' salaries were shown to be lower than those of other city employees.

MANY VETERANS HAVE
MONEY AWAITING THEM

Subscribed to Victory Bonds, But Did Not Complete Purchase.

Military authorities are trying to locate a large number of men who subscribed for Victory bonds while in the army, and upon discharge continuing paying installments due. Efforts have been made to get in touch with these men, but no answer has been received to the letters. Various amounts have been paid on bonds ranging from \$5 to \$50. All the money paid on these bonds will be refunded if applications are made to the authorities. A long list of names has been sent to J. W. Cunliffe, secretary of the G. W. V. A., to add in locating of the men.

STORM VICTIMS IN SPAIN.
Madrid, Oct. 2.—Interruption of railroad traffic and telegraph communication prevents details of conditions in Eastern Spain where torrential rains have fallen from becoming known. It is reported that eighteen bodies have been discovered in the mountains at Alicante. At the latter place large hailstones were piled in some places to a depth of one foot, many houses collapsing under the weight.

BALLOON LANDS ON BARN.

Sherbrooke, Que., Oct. 3.—One of the balloons in the international balloon race, with Ralph Upson, and W. T. Van Orman on board, landed on a barn at Stanbridge last night. The balloon, which was carrying a large amount of mail, landed shortly after 8 o'clock last night, covering about one thousand miles in 26 hours. The operators made an attempt to land the balloon, but were forced down by the heavy rain. The balloon was damaged, but the men were unhurt. 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CLEVELANDERS COMING
TO GET TO KNOW LONDONERS AND
HELP BREAK DOWN ALL BARRIERS

Give Credit to Men of This City For Initiating Movement and Appreciate the Good Which Is Likely To Follow.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 3.—The coming week will see an invasion of Canada by citizens of the United States. This will be a friendly invasion, however, and the invaders will be members of the manufacturers and wholesale merchants' board of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, who will arrive at Hamilton, Ont., at 7:10 o'clock Tuesday morning, October 7, for a week's visit among leading cities of Ontario.

A. E. Brown of the Carey Company of Cleveland has the delegation in charge, and is well prepared to present a glowing Cleveland to the merchants and manufacturers of Ontario, because he was the chairman of a similar delegation last year.

There is much need of English-speaking people getting closer together, and the fact that the subject of the delegation is to visit Ontario during the night without being stopped for a passport, to say nothing of searching for military or political objections of any kind, shows how nearly we are together already.

One barrier that exists between the United States and Great Britain is an artificial one, entitled the "tariff." It is going to melt away, and the pressure of the mutual friendship of the two nations is a means of forcing a breach in that wall, and a better mutual understanding is created. Closer friendships won and more direct business relations established, will see the mutual benefit of having tariff laws.

Bonds Welded.
"I need not say anything about the close ties of affiliation which have grown stronger between these two English-speaking peoples during the last few years. Those who have been welded together by common purpose, by common sacrifice for a common cause, what we desire to do is to build for the future a good fellowship which these ties have so truly established. Business depends upon confidence and confidence comes from acquaintance, and it is for the purpose of establishing better acquaintance that we are going to visit them this week."

GIRL ROOMERS TO
FIGHT RENT EVILS

Secretary of Detroit Y.W.C.A. Bureau Hears Troubles of Young Women.

Detroit, Oct. 3.—Girl roomers have their troubles as well as harassed tenants, according to Miss M. C. Mousier, secretary of the rooming bureau of the Y. W. C. A. at 225 West Adams Avenue, who spent most of Wednesday afternoon reasoning with one of the rooming ladies who was complaining of a girl roomer with eviction.

In question the girl with the rooming lady, who was evicted, had appealed to the Y. W. C. A. for help because she was unable to pay the \$8 a week asked for the room. The girl was asked to pay the \$8 a week, but when the girl returned from her landlady, she was greeted with an angry tirade and the price of the room was increased to \$10 a week.

One old lady who had been supplied with a cheap room, had recently remarked to some of the other roomers a few days ago that she might be able to get a better room before long. The next day she received a note from her landlady asking her to vacate her room immediately.

So the stories are. At present the association has about 50 available rooms on its list, most of them rooms for two or three persons ranging from \$8 to \$10 a week. Only a few single rooms are at \$4 to \$6 a week. It seems to be the case that the rooming ladies are not willing to accept a room for a full-sized bed must serve as a room for two persons, with a price accordingly.
