YORK TOWNSHIP TOTS TO PASTEUR INSTITUTE

Two Little Girls Near Weston Bitten by Dog and Cat--Prompt Measures Adopted.

WESTON, Sept. 25.--(Special.)--Considerable excitement and not a little anxiety was occasioned here to-day by the report received by Dr. Irwin last night, and made public this morning, concerning the medical analysis made by the provincial health department on the heads of a dog and cat forwarded by the doctor last week, and supposed to be infected with rabies. The causes leading up to the killing and examination of the animals were the facts that they had a week ago bitten two little girls on the outskirts of the town, coupled with their strange actions.

It was decided to send the little girls, whose ages are, respectively, 5 and 7 years, to the Pasteur Institute in New York, which will be done this afternoon, and the expense of which will be borne by the township.

EAST TORONTO COUNCIL WILL BACK ANNEXATION

Spirit of Movement is Strong and Don't Want Quibbles--York County News.

EAST TORONTO, Sept. 25.--The wind up of to-night's council meeting (a special one) was characterized by all the elements of a hot election after-dispute, only the subject matter under dispute was not of a political nature. Acting Mayor John Little was in the chair, with just enough members present to constitute a good legal quorum. Considerable routine business was put thru and all went well until the question of annexation was introduced, brought about by an invitation from city solicitor Chisholm: that the railway and municipal board would be prepared to hear the township's plea for annexation up in the legislative buildings on Tuesday next at 11 o'clock.

The suggestion that Solicitor Grant should represent the township council drew strong opposition from Deputy Reeve Brown. "I have no objection to the solicitor going along, but we know his attitude on the matter," said the deputy-reeve, "and we don't want legal quibbles raised at this point." Chairman of Finance Fien took exception to the solicitor's exclusion. "If our cause is right," said he, "we need conceal nothing from the city. Let us submit the whole matter, keeping back nothing and abide by the result."

This matter has never been taken out of the hands of the annexation committee," said Councillor Baker, "and we object to the presence of Solicitor Grant for the purpose of pointing out defects in any of the resolutions of two years. In an advisory capacity and as a townsman the solicitor would be welcome. He tried to introduce a measure along that line, but would have none of it."

Another resolution of Council for Phoenix, favoring the presence of the solicitor, and suggesting the addition of a representative from the added district, was submitted, but not voted upon. The council will go up in a body, and the solicitor will be in the company. Secretary Givens and the board of education were present and council will issue debentures to the amount of \$15,000 for school expenditure contracted for. Council refused on the advice of \$61,000, and the amount needed to pay the interest on the debentures, if any resulting from Dunlop Tire road races on Saturday, Oct. 3, and the company assumed all risks.

WEST TORONTO. Specialists Decide to Place Candidate in Nomination.

WEST TORONTO, Sept. 25.--The Socialists have decided to put a candidate in the field in South York, and their first campaign meeting was held at the corner of the corner of Dundas-streets. Some interruptions of speakers by non-sympathetic bystanders nearly led to blows, but the police kept the sidewalks clear and no trouble resulted. Four boys, all about 17 years old, were arrested to-night on a charge of stealing lumber from the Canada Cycle Co. They were put in the cells overnight and will be brought before Police Magistrate Ellis in the morning. The capacity of the cells was further taxed by the presence of two vagrants who asked to be given a night's lodging. The medical health officer had Geo. H. Kinnis up for the purpose of keeping up sanitary premises. He promised to remove the objectionable building, and the case was withdrawn.

James Davis, an Englishman, was fined \$2 and costs for using unbecoming language to Mrs. Sarah Parson of Louisa-street. The cash against A. M. Gabel, who was charged with keeping a vicious dog, was dismissed on a promise that the animal would be destroyed.

After many adjournments the case against Thomas Noble and William Good, moulders on strike at the Moffat Stove Works, was disposed of in the police court this morning by the committing of the men for trial. The public library board met to-night and arranged for the commencement of building operations on the new Carnegie Library. To-morrow the digging of the foundations will begin. Conservatives from Wards 4 and 5 met to-night and appointed delegates to the Conservative convention to-morrow at the Labor Temple, who are candidates for South York for the federal elections will be chosen. The council have arranged to meet the representatives of the Interurban Electric Co., successors to the Stark T. L. and P. System, on Tuesday evening to make definite arrangements about the amendments in the original agreement between the company and the municipality.

A special committee, consisting of the school board and principals of the different schools, was held to-day to make arrangements for the field day on Oct. 10. Trustee C. F. Wright was appointed chairman of the sports committee.

INQUEST WILL BE HELD INTO WOMAN'S DEATH

Mrs. Anne Conner of Box Grove Died From Septic Poisoning Said to Be Due to Herself. Acting upon information supplied to the county crown attorney's office by Coroner Wesley Robinson of Markham, Chief Coroner Arthur Jukes Johnson will go to that place to-day to perform a post-mortem examination on the body of Mrs. Anne Conner of Boxgrove. The body has been buried since Sept. 17. An inquest will be opened by Coroner Robinson, which will then be adjourned a week.

After the woman was buried the coroner was informed by the attending physician, Dr. McDonald of Markham, that the woman had died of septic poisoning, said by the neighbors to have been induced by a self-performed operation to effect a miscarriage. The coroner enquired and confirmed this information. Assistant County Crown Attorney T. Louis Monahan immediately ordered the inquest.

MARKHAM. Council Pass Bylaw to Authorize the Issue of Debentures.

The amount needed to pay the present indebtedness, \$10,000, will be realized at once if no unforeseen complications arise. The bylaw will be submitted to the Railway Board to secure the validation of the bylaw.
