JACK NEVILLE ARRESTED FOR SHOOTING CONSTABLE

Police Allege He Was Burglar Who Shot Smith, But Friends Claim an Alibi.

HAMILTON, April 8.—(Special.)—The police sprang a surprise this evening and arrested Jack Neville, 17 Harriet-street, on the charge of shooting Constable Harry Smith. The shooting took place on March 4, at the home of W. Kapelle, 241 Harriet-street. The house was unoccupied at the time and the constable hearing a noise in the cellar, after surrounding the house with neighbors, went into the alleyway in the rear and found a man crouching in the shadows of the wall. In answer to the constable's shouts, two of which struck the constable and the burglar fired several shots, a good look at the man and it appeared as tho the authorities were up against a difficult case.

This afternoon Constables Brannan and Tuck arrested Neville, who has been employed as a marker and porter at William Carson's pool room, Merrick and MacNab-streets, on a warrant charging him with shooting the constable with intent to kill. The prisoner was one of the first to reach the newspaper offices after the shooting took place, and he stood about discussing the bulletins, according to several of his pals.

The authorities absolutely decline to give out any of the details of the case against the prisoner. About the only clue they secured at the time was a knife that was dropped by the burglar when disturbed in the house. The police are seeking to prove that the knife belongs to the prisoner, but his wife and father and mother declare that he never carried a knife. They also say that he did not carry a revolver. The constable and the prisoner had some trouble several weeks before the shooting and the Neville family think this is what led to the arrest.

William Carson, for whom Neville works, said to-night that he remembered the night of the shooting and was positive that Neville was working at the time. When the news reached the pool room, Neville remarked, "It's a good job that I was working to-night or they might have thought it was me." Neville then hurried over to a newspaper office to read the bulletins. This prisoner is about 21 years of age.

Lunatic's Suicide.
An elderly inmate of the asylum threw himself under a passing wagon at the institution to-night and was killed. Coroner McNicol was notified and is awaiting instructions from the crown attorney as to an inquest.

Capt. William Gilbert of the central fire station has been appointed chief of the fire department at Saskatoon.

The finance committee of the city council this afternoon gave the city a grant of \$250, on condition that the use it in the purchase of permanent grounds. The library board was authorized to sell the present library building, to purchase a new site for the Carnegie library and to occupy the new building subject to the approval of the city council. The council will meet at 7:30 Tuesday evening. T. M. Wright and F. P. Dalley were re-appointed to the library board.

Board of Education.
Trustee C. G. Booker this evening gave the board of education notice that at the next meeting he would introduce a motion prohibiting members of the board from dipping into the miscellaneous account for expenses for deputes, by the chairman of the board. Trustee Thomas W. Wilkins also gave notice of motion to rechristen the Sophia-street School. He wants to name it Strathcona. E. D. Cahill will be offered \$3800 for his property adjoining the Stinson-street School, to provide more playgrounds. The daughters of the Empire wrote offering to give a rifle to the boy who proved himself to be the best shot in the city. Wilton was appointed principal of the technical school at a salary of \$2000.

Dr. Grenfell delivered an address this evening in Association Hall in aid of his project to establish a sailor's home. P. Soyceck's house of Whitfield-avenue was burned to the ground this evening.

THREE MONTHS FOR READE

Switch Foreman Acquitted on Charge of Negligence.
COBourg, April 8.—(Special.)—Brakeman Charles Julien Reade, who was found guilty last night by a jury on a charge of criminal negligence of duty in connection with the Sandbank wreck, was to-night sentenced by Justice Britton to three months in the county jail here.

William Reade was acquitted to-night on a charge of criminal negligence and neglect of duty. He was the section foreman on the C.P.R. at the point where the wreck occurred. It was his duty to have the switch lamps supplied with oil and he was alleged to have neglected this. D. Burke Simpson, K.C., Bowmanville, defended the prisoner.

Albert Ambrose, an Englishman who tried to commit suicide by taking laudanum, was sentenced to six months in the Central Prison. Steps may be taken to have him deported.

To Reduce Insurance Rates.
The Underwriters' Fire Association have for some time been considering the question of a general reduction of fire insurance rates throughout Ontario, and if the present intention is adhered to there will be a general reduction in all places outside of the big centres, where risks are now carried on small premiums.

MME. MODJESKA DEAD

Famous Polish Actress, Who Was Exiled From Native Land.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 8.—Countess Bozenta (Mme. Helena Modjeska), the famous Polish tragedienne and one of the most noted actresses of the American stage, died at 10 o'clock to-day in her island home in Bay-City, Orange County, at the age of 62, after an illness of about two months.

Count Bozenta said the reason he and his wife came from Poland in 1876 was because he was exiled for his political writings and Mme. Modjeska by imperial ukase was debarred from the Polish stage.

Following the publication of the statements made in a paper read by Modjeska at the World's Fair in Chicago, concerning Russian-Polish politics, and the former order was issued barring Modjeska from Russian possessions.

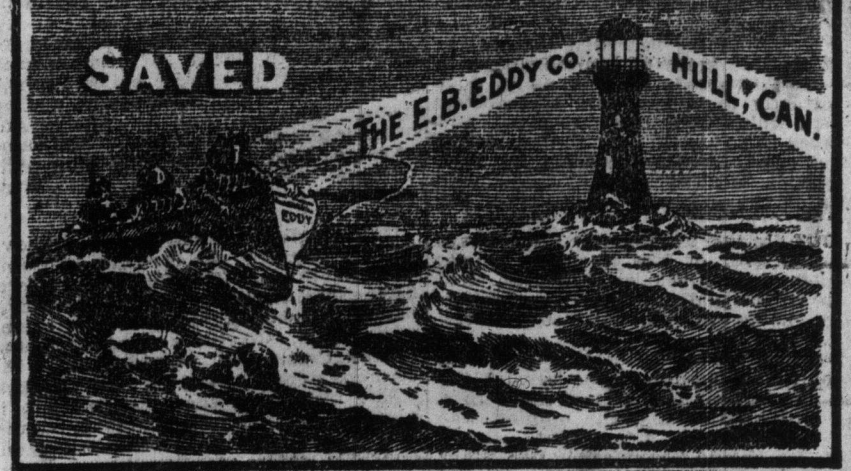
