At the annual meeting of the Wesley Methodist Church Ladios' Aid Society, the secretary reported the supplies for the Toronto Base Hospital as follows, from June 17, 1915 until May 4, 1916: Sheets, 84: pillow cases, 576; surgical shirts, 588; T bandages, 444: abdominal bandages, 252; linen towels, 30; wash cloths, 648; sox, 261 pairs; handkerchiefs, 600; convalescent slippers, 60 pairs; mouth wipes, 500; tape sponges, 60. In addition to this 1016 sheets and 276 pillow cases were sent direct to the Canadian Base Hospitals in France, making a total of 5495 articles sent for the year.

## **HEARTY WELCOME** TO RETURNED MEN

Sixty-one Heroes of Active Service Arrived in Toronto.

PROMISED ASSISTANCE

Mayor Church and Prominent Citizens Take Part in Greetings.

Sixty-one soldiers who have been on active service overseas returned to Toronto yesterday morning and were accorded a very enthusiastic welcome by the crowd of over 1000 relatives and friends who met the train from Quebec when it pulled into the North Tonge Street Staton at 8 o'clock, exactly on time.

Nearly 20 contingents of war heroe have already arrived in Toronto. Th one which returned yesterday contained 45 soldiers who had enlisted in this city, and 16 whose homes are in Hamilton, Brantford, St. Catharines and other points of No. 2 military division

A Great Welcome. The band of the 180th Sportsmen's Battalion, and an escort of 80 memhers of that unit took part in the recoption tendered the home-coming soldiers. Among the prominent citizens who welcomed the men at the station were: Mayor Church, Controlle Thompson, Ald. Maguire, Ryding and Ramsden; Sgt.-Major George Crighton, J. Somers, W. D. McPherson, M.L. With 400 of their friends, the soldiers gathered in the auditorium and heard speech of welcome by Mayor Church, G. I. Riddell, on behalf of the hospitais' commission; W. D. McPherson, M.L.A., representing the Contario Government, and W. Coleman the Voluntary Aid Association.

Mayor Church, in welcoming the soldiers back, expressed his admiration of the work the soldiers had done for the British Empire, and assured them that the city council and the industrial concerns of Toronto would assist thom in every way possible and give the war veterans precedence. Altho the returned men only arrived at the Military Home a 8.30 a.m., by 10.15 a.m. all of them had been served a fine breakfast and were out orsed his sentiments.
