

By an overwholming mejority, the Trades and Labor Congress went on record at the afternoon session as being opposed to the Demieux Act in its entirety. This action followed several long sessions devoted to the discussion of the administration of the Lemieux Act and also to a draft act which the executive council had drawn up by J.
