

MONEY RACED FOR CANADA SEASON JUST CLOSED, \$1,809,285

KENILWORTH LEADS CANADIAN TRACKS; WINDSOR AND ONTARIO J. C. NEXT

A Year's Statistics in Racing of Sixteen Jockey Clubs—
Riddle Leading Owner, Followed by Ross, Hendrie and Giddings.

The season just closed was the greatest in the Dominion. Especially was the money distributed among winning owners noteworthy. The total was the huge sum of \$1,809,285, the greatest previous record in that regard being \$1,000,000 in 1916. This would have been beaten in 1917 but for the order-in-council, which suddenly stopped racing that year when about half of the scheduled meetings remained to be carried out. The lavish money provision for 1920 was rewarded with such a responsive attendance that the Canadian Racing Association enjoyed a high measure of prosperity, despite the heavy daily tax levied by the government. The racing was up to a high standard, and from time to time the best horses on this side of the Atlantic were among those seen in action. Five racing clubs averaged in excess of \$10,000 in the matter of daily distribution. Kenilworth Park leading because of the \$80,000 in money and prizes given for the famous clashing of Man o' War and Sir Barton. But for that race Kenilworth would have been third to Windsor and Woodbine.

and \$550. Glen Riddle Farm Stable, otherwise Samuel D. Riddle, stands as the leading money-winner of the Canadian racing field, solely because of the outcome of the Man o' War-Sir Barton race. J. K. L. Ross would otherwise have been the winner. His Canadian race of \$14,175 for the year shows that his provision of a stable for an exclusively Canadian campaign was a profitable enterprise, as well as helpful in adding to the attractions of racing in the Dominion. The stable of George M. Hendrie was third in money won, with a total greater than ever before fell to his share. As notable feature, outgrowth of the record-breaking total raced for, is that in Canada this year thirty-nine owners won \$10,000 or more, something unheard of in previous Canadian racing statistics. Following Mr. Hendrie, in order, the stables of H. Giddings, J. T. Zolkofer, Sunnyland Stable, James Arthur, W. S. Kilmer, W. C. Weant, J. R. Skinner, F. Farrar and T. Hodge all won in excess of \$20,000. Those who participated in the big Canadian distribution to the extent of \$15,000 or more were the following:

CANADA-BRED WON IN HUNTER CLASS

Attendance on Second Day of New York Horse Show Was Very Large.

New York, Nov. 16.—(By Can. Press.)—Despite the most adverse weather conditions, driving rain and a bitter wind, attendance at the horse show on the second day of the annual society classic was very large. Madison Square Garden attracted by their thousands the horse-lovers, and also those who wished to gaze on the brilliant spectacle that marks the opening of New York's social season.

As entertainment for the general public this year's show probably eclipsed all its predecessors, since a number of attractions have been added to the program that appeal to those who do not know the points of a horse. A polo match each evening is one of these, while each day there are a number of military events on the menu. The military entries run all the way from officers' charges to teams for the heavy guns. The horse show grounds and stands are pronounced by connoisseurs to be as brilliant as usual.

The first accident of the show occurred this morning when Texas, a six-year-old chestnut gelding, a three-time blue ribbon winner, owned by Major Burton, was probably fatally injured when he plumped from a truck at the entrance to the garden, landing on his head.

Interest in the morning program was centered in the class for ponies other than the Shetlands, not exceeding 12 hands, three years old or over, and competition for the Berezford Challenge Cup, which was presented by Col. Lord Dodes in 1915.

Philip Murray, international vice-president of the United Mine Workers, arrived today from Pittsburgh to represent the international organization in the wage negotiations.
