GOSSIP ABOUT SESSION
OF SUPREME COURT I. O. F.**H. W. Woods, M.P.P. May be Nominated for an Office—
United States Wants Recognition—Officers and Salaries—
The Orphans' Home.**

(Toronto Globe, Monday.)

With the arrival of the Californian delegation this morning the list of delegates to the convention of the I. O. F., which opens on Tuesday, will be practically complete. Australia's lone representative and the delegates from the British Isles having already arrived. In the meantime the special committee of 25, formed from the various standing committees of the order, who have been considering the financial position of the order, with direct reference to rates, have practically completed their labors. It is on their proposals that the main struggle will take place, for it is now beyond doubt that they will recommend that the old members' rates should be levelled up with the new. Practically bound up with this will be the fight for the office of Supreme Chief Ranger, for which the Supreme Chief Ranger, Elliott G. Stevenson, will be re-nominated. Mr. Stevenson is the chief advocate of the change, and his most formidable, and probably only opponent, Supreme Treasurer Harry Collins, is opposed to it.

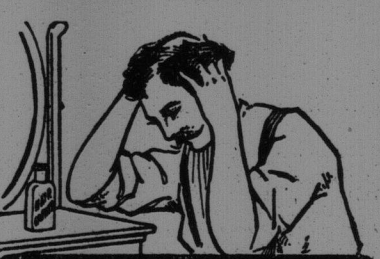
UNITED STATES WANTS RECOGNITION.

The attitude of the delegates from the United States, in view of their majority, is of considerable interest. On the question of the candidature for Supreme Chief Ranger, so far as could be gathered last night, about 75 per cent. of those who have already arrived are in favor of the re-election of Mr. Stevenson. They are united, however, on another matter, and that is that the United States should receive recognition by election to one of the high offices of a candidate from across the line. In this regard it may be mentioned that only two offices, those of Supreme Vice-Chief Ranger and Supreme Counselor, under the constitution can be so filled. For the last-named office Mr. John G. K. Myers, a New York lawyer, is receiving strong support as a candidate, and should the United States delegates unite in favor of him he will be elected. Mr. Myers is credited with having introduced the scheme to place the old members on a level with the new.

PROPOSED COMPROMISE.

In their proposals that the rates for old members should be increased, however, they have not gone all the way with the Supreme Chief Ranger, and will not recommend that the old members should be penalized to the extent of the difference between their old rates and the new, but will favor that such difference should be charged up to loss and gain. This will remove the objection which many delegates had to the executive scheme, and solidify a large body in favor of the proposed change.

So strong have been the expression of opinion by arriving delegates that last night the rumor that Mr. Harry Collins might withdraw from the contest gained

Oronhyatekha, which is capable of accommodating 200 inmates, has been a source of heavy expense. Last year there were 89 children in the institution, and a recommendation, it is understood, will be brought before the convention urging its removal to the neighborhood of Toronto, where it can be better supervised.

**MR. STEVENSON
SUPREME CHIEF**

**Old Executive Re-Elected by
Foresters Supreme Court—
Some Changes Made in the
Regulations.**

Toronto, June 17.—The principal business at today's session of supreme court of Independent Foresters, was the appointment of a committee to prepare a suitable memorial to the late supreme chief Oronhyatekha. Two or three reports were presented.

The committee on constitution and laws reported by W. H. Hunter, the total disability department is done away with and the work of that department is transferred to the mortuary department.

After September 30, applicants initiated shall be deemed to be the age of the nearest birthday at the date of initiation. Heretofore they have been rated as of age at the last birthday.

Women may be admitted as social members to companion courts or courts into which both sexes are admitted. It is now definitely provided that the offices of financial secretary and treasurer in local courts shall not be combined in one person.

**LAURIER SILENT
ON ELECTION
BILL**

**Expected Statement About the
Ayiesworth Bill Withheld in
the House.**

Ottawa, June 17.—The expectation of a deliverance today by the prime minister on the government's position in regard to the Ayiesworth bill was doomed to disappointment. Ministerial measures were under discussion during both sittings of the house and some advance was made, but Sir Wilfrid maintained silence upon the subject that evidently was uppermost in the minds of members.

It was the subject of discussion at the opposition caucus in the morning, when Mr. Borden explained the course of negotiations, and Mr. Borden of Alberta enlightened his colleagues upon the possible effect of the clause dealing with the organized districts.

This afternoon the house again turned its attention to law making and succeeded in disposing of two bills, fathered by the finance minister, namely a bill respecting government-guaranteed bonds of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway and a bill providing subsidies for dry docks.

Mr. Ames wanted to know if these subsidies would be available for municipalities constructing dry docks.

Mr. Fielding did not seem enthusiastic over municipal ownership but stated that a municipality would receive the same consideration as a private company.

Leighton McCarthy (North Simcoe), evidently had Collingwood in mind, when he expressed a view that existing companies should be protected against municipal competition. No municipality should be aided in close proximity to a private company's dry dock, he argued.

Both Messrs. Fielding and Ames took the same view and this principle, the finance minister added, would apply to a new company seeking to compete with an existing company.

The bill to amend the Chinese immigration act stood over until the word "stratagem" as used in the act, could be more clearly defined.

Mr. Graham's bill, giving the railway commission control of telegraphs and telephones was still under discussion when the house rose at 6 o'clock.

Mr. Northrup (Hastings), moved an amendment to allow the board to investigate a case where the G. T. R. has failed to operate a short line of railway in Hastings county, for which he alleges it received a subsidy of \$21,000.

Mr. Graham opposed it as "retroactive" legislation.

The debate on this amendment was adjourned till tomorrow to allow the minister of justice to make a statement.

Moncton, N. B., June 17.—The ministerial sessions were continued in the N. B. and P. E. I. conference today and the first public meeting was held tonight. Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent, presided. The greater part of the session and the principal business to engage the attention of the ministers was the standing of probationers and the accepting of candidates for the ministry.

Harry Strothard, son of Rev. James Strothard, Moncton, was recommended for ordination and will be ordained Sunday morning. Candidates accepted for the ministry are as follows:

Tonight a public meeting was held in the interest of the sustentation fund. Rev. J. K. King presided. Rev. A. C.
