

### Hamilton Tigers Defeat Argos Neither Team Scored a Try

#### Score Was 13 to 4, With Tigers Getting All Their Points From Kicks to Behind the Line.

Altho Argos failed to defeat Hamilton Tigers at Rosedale field on Sunday, they gave the visitors a still better game than they had given them in the last period of the score 11 to 4, the visitors had the wind behind them, they had apparently a good chance to win out, but Tigers showed their ability as finishers by keeping the play in Argos territory. Nearly all the time in the final quarter the game was witnessed by about 3500 spectators. Three policemen on duty were unable to cope with the hordes of spectators who swarmed into the grandstand at half time and invaded the field in the last quarter. Not a try was scored, all the points being rolled up by dead line kicks, rousings and M. Kent's dropped goal which gave Argos three of their four points.

For Argos the back division played a remarkably steady game, but lack of good running halves was again demonstrated. Their wings were quite as good, if not better than the Tigers, with Norcross doing some good tackling. Capt. Coryell also shone in this respect. The Tiger halves were unable until towards the end to get away for their usual brilliant runs, but Tope and Simpson did some effective sprinting. A strong northerly wind was a factor of the game and the weather was raw and disagreeable. The game was clean, only one penalty being inflicted.

Raw disagreeable weather interfered with the attendance for the Argonaut-Tiger game at Rosedale this afternoon, but about 3000 spectators were on hand, including a chrysanthemum bedecked contingent of 200 from Hamilton, who occupied the grandstand. The bleachers were well filled. The visiting team were late in arriving, and it was nearly 3 p.m., or half an hour after schedule time, when Referee Robbins started the game. A strong east wind was blowing. The teams lined up: Argonauts: Full, D. Taylor, halves, Knight, M. Kent, quarter, Coryell, scrum, Russell, H. Brown, P. #### Tigers Win Toss.

Hamilton won the toss and chose to kick west with the wind, which was growing stronger each minute, threatening to develop into a gale. Russell's kick-off was returned. Coryell secured at centre. Two bucks failed and Kent tried to kick, but Craig blocked, the ball rolling to Argos 20-yard line, where D. Taylor got it. Kent's punt was returned by Simpson and Wigle got the loose ball 15 yards out. Argos' line held like a stone wall, Tigers losing the ball on downs. Kent's punt relieved, but Simpson kicked to dead line. Score, 1 to 0.

Tigers started to kick freely taking full advantage of wind, keeping Scullers constantly on the defensive. Marriott started a dribble and it looked like a sure try, but Green followed up, was fouled into touch in goal. A minute later Simpson kicked another dead line. Score, Hamilton 4, Argos 0. Argos gained ground on kicking. Their wing line is showing itself inferior to Hamilton's, but the wind is the ruling factor at this stage. Simpson kicked another dead line. Score 5 to 0. Argos showed ability to buck by kicking 10 yards on two downs. Hamilton, however, soon added another point when M. Kent fozzled a pass from Coryell. Isebert dribbled the plug into the dead line. Quarter over, score Tigers 6, Argos 0. Both Teams Playing a Steady Game. The onsemen with the wind in their backs, took the initiative, while Ham-

ilton resorted to tucking game. Both back divisions are playing a steady game, considering the difficulty in judging punts. Moore tried a cross-field run, but was nailed by Norcross without a gain. Argos are breaking thru well and giving the Tiger halves little chance to get away. Finally, however, Smith got started on a brilliant dodging run for thirty yards.

#### Tigers 6, Argos 4, Half Time.

Jeff Taylor stole ball and Greens punted for line, but referee didn't allow play. Referee's decisions of Hamilton is showing impartiality however, and the mountaineers are being more frequently penalized for a fiasco work than Argos. Tope did the spectacular work when he ran back to a punt behind the line for 35 yards, eluding tackle after tackle. Argos had great chance to score when Smith tried to kick from behind Tiger's line. The wind carried the ball back and Argos wings were right under it when it fell, but Smith secured the ball, Norcross forcing a rouse.

Score 6 to 1. Within a minute of re-starting, M. Kent dropped a neat goal from 25 yards, making score Hamilton 6, Argos 4 at half time. Russell kicked off Awer, who returned to Knight, Lyon tackling the latter a few yards out. Argos lost on downs; Tope kicked to deadline. Score 7 to 4. Green tried to carry out ball Simpson's long punt, but Wigle's tackle forced a rouse—5 to 4—the referee's ruling calling play back to Argos' 40-yard line after Kent punted to Simpson and the latter was tackled, causing a storm of protest from the stands. Argos are holding opposing wings well and frequently gain ground on bucks.

#### Tigers Ahead 11 to 4.

Simpson, returning Kent's punt, kicked into touch in goal. Score 9 to 4. Simpson kicked over Argos' line; M. Kent secured and avoided being forced to rouse by a long, risky pass to D. Taylor, who carried ball out and into touch. Simpson kicked twice to dead line, adding two points to score. Tigers 11, Argos 4. Coryell distinguished himself by intercepting a Tiger pass and Argos broke thru for a gain of 20 yards. Kent kicked into touch at Tigers' end. Third quarter over. Tigers 11, Argos 4. Argos now have the wind, and their chances look good. D. Taylor's off side work gave Hamilton possession at 20 yards. Knight returned Simpson's kick, Moore making his mark. Tigers lost on downs. Kent kicked to centre, relieving situation. Simpson kicked into touch. Tope in trying to catch Kent's kick was charged by Pud Kent and laid out for a few minutes. Kent was ruled off, being the first penalty of the game.

#### Tigers 13, Argos 4.

Tigers are playing well against the wind, keeping the play at Argos end. Smith and Moore worked in good combination runs. Norcross made a fine tackle of Tope, stopping a dangerous end run. Knight fumbled Simpson's kick behind the line and was tackled by Lyon. Score 12 to 4. Simpson ran 30 yards thru a broken field. Coryell's tackle of Smith stopped a dangerous dash of 20 yards out. The crowd are now completely beyond control of the police, and are swarming round the touch line. Kent had to rouse. Score 12 to 4. Quarter over. Final score, Hamilton 13, Argos 4.

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.—The final game of the Intercollegiate Rugby series was played here this afternoon between the strong Varsity team and McGill, before a large crowd, which overflowed to the side lines. The weather was ideal for football, as there was little wind. A large contingent of Toronto students accompanied the team and made a lot of noise, both on the grandstand around town last night. During the first half McGill played a much stronger game than at any time this season.
