## THE STEEL-COAL NEGOTIATIONS

## What Has Been Effected Toward a Settlement of Their Famous Dispute

Montreal, March 23.—The following shows what has been effected since the Steel-Coal negotiations started a couple of weeks ago:

1. Agreement drawn up and its terms approved by the Dominion Coal and Steel Company, the Dominion Coal Company, and the National Trust Company. This has not been signed.
2. Amending the order drawn up to allow assessment in present suit of damages to date.
3. The coal company now wants a full statement of the steel company's claim, with vouchers so far as possible.
4. On signing and delivery of these on the same moment the coal company will pay \$2,500,000 on account.
5. So far as vouchers in excess of \$2,500,000 are approved and verified by the coal company the latter company will pay the claims.
6. The steel company has presented a claim for excess money paid to the coal company, which amount has been based upon the coal company's own vouchers. These vouchers the coal company have been asked to check, but evidently have not done so.

## LUMBERMEN MEET AT FREDERICTON

## Lumbermen and Limit Holders Will Present a Memorial to the Government

Fredericton, N. B., March 23.—Hon. John P. Burchill presided at a large and representative meeting of the members of the New Brunswick Lumbermen's and Limit Holders' Association held in a committee room of the parliament building this afternoon. R. A. Lawlor acted as secretary. Those present included Allen Ritchie, Newcastle; Randolph, Fredericton; Robeson, Millville; J. Fraser Gregory, Henry Millard, John E. Moore, St. John; A. H. Pitt-Randolph, Fredericton; F. M. Anderson, Campbellton; T. M. Byrne, Bathurst; John Maloney and D. J. Buckley, Rogersville.

Several matters were discussed, including the qualifications of scalars and fire wardens, and a committee composed of Messrs. Ritchie, Anderson, Millard, Randolph, and J. E. Moore was appointed to prepare a memorial to the government embodying the views of the lumbermen, and will submit the same for approval to another meeting called for tomorrow afternoon.

There was some discussion regarding crown land leases and the consensus of opinion among those present was that at the expiration of the lease the government should compensate the holder for any improvements made. Possibly a memorial to be drawn up may recommend that perpetual leases be granted.

## MORE AID TO THE EMPIRE

## Canadian Government Has Under Consideration a Plan to Provide for Coast Defence

Ottawa, March 23.—The present alarm felt in Great Britain over the disclosures with respect to the invasion of the British naval supremacy by Germany is causing considerable interest among the members of parliament and will undoubtedly lead to an important debate on the resolution on the order paper, in the name of Hon. Mr. Foster, declaring that Canada must delay no longer in providing for her own coast defence.

Considerable pressure is being brought to bear upon the government to take steps looking to a more active participation by Canada in bearing the burden of imperial defence.

Members of the opposition in caucus this morning unanimously decided to support Mr. Foster's resolution. The whole question is now under the consideration of the government and the resolution will probably be accepted in spirit if not in actual wording. The policy of the government is to gradually work both towards an army and a navy adequate for the defence of Canada and maintained solely by Canada, thus insuring a proper share by Canada of the burden of imperial defence.

## KIDNAPPERS OF WILLIE WHITLA UNDER ARREST

## Man and Woman Caught Last Night with \$9,990 on Them

Cleveland, Ohio, March 23.—In the arrest here tonight of a man and woman having \$9,990 in their possession, the police have they have captured the kidnapers of Willie Whitla. In fact the woman in the case who is somewhat befuddled, admitted that she had been responsible for the kidnapping. When placed in custody at the central police station she said to Captain Shattuck: "I am the one who planned the kidnapping. I am the one who took the money and hid it in Sharon tomorrow."

Beneath the woman's skirts was found \$9,990. All of it but \$40 was in packages with the original slips placed on the money when Whitla took it from the bank still encumbered with the debt of Captain Northing Shattuck and Detective Frank Wood made the arrests in the east end of the city.

When near the police station the man broke away from Detective Wood and ran towards an alley. The police officer from two shots from his revolver into the air and the man stopped. The woman made no attempt to escape.

The woman appears to be well educated and is refined in manner.

The couple declare they are not man and wife.

According to the police they were intoxicated when placed in custody. Due to their condition, they were not questioned closely by the police and were locked in separate cells. Both will be arraigned in the police court tomorrow on the charge of abduction, according to Detective Wood.

A feature of the meeting was the presentation of a life membership to Miss Elizabeth Patton. The presentation was made by Mrs. George F. Smith on behalf of the ladies. Mrs. G. A. Kuhring read the membership certificate and Mrs. A. H. Hanington pinned on the gold pin of membership.

## SOME OF THE CHANGES IN THE LIQUOR LICENSE ACT

## All Screens Must Be Removed from Saloons and They Must Close on All Public Holidays and at 5 p. m. on Saturday—No Local Option Election Until 1910—Proceedings in the Legislature

Fredericton, March 23.—Much business was discussed at this afternoon's session of the house. Although the legislature is gradually getting down to business it will hardly be in full working order until next week.

The amendments to the liquor license act were discussed and are quite numerous and drastic.

Screens will have to be removed. Saloons will not be permitted to open on holidays or before 7 a. m., and will close on Saturday at 5 o'clock.

There will be no local option election until 1910.

Hon. Mr. Landry, in reply to Mr. Cope, gave the particulars of the cost of the last horse importation. The horses were inspected by William H. Rowe, government veterinary of Ohio, for diseases, but not for blemishes.

Twenty horses were purchased at a cost of \$3,290.

The cost of keeping the horses in Kentucky was \$88,420. The cost of the transportation charges were \$456.35 and the cost of keeping the horses in St. John from their arrival to the date of sale was \$871.30.

The advertising cost \$229.46, and the auctioneer's fee \$22. Delivery of the horses was at St. John.

The total cost of the importation was \$93,800, and there are bills unpaid amounting to \$1,058.

There is still due from the purchasers \$4,218.60, which is secured by joint notes of responsible persons.

Mr. Clinch was paid \$325 for his services and \$60.38 were paid him for his own and other expenses.

The debate on the address was advanced another step, but it is not likely that it will be finished tomorrow.

Mr. Byrne, of Gloucester, finished his address today, dealing first with government promises to Gloucester County, and the proposal to develop the Gloucester iron mines. To Mr. Byrne belongs the credit of bringing to the notice of the house the scandalous misrepresentations of Mr. Hazen and Mr. Fleming during the election campaign of 1907, regarding the bonded debt of the province. These gentlemen had gone up and down the country shouting with blazon effrontery that the province was bankrupt, and that the debt was given at \$5,834,333, which includes the amount added this year.

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Mr. Hazen said the suggestion was a good one, and would be complied with.

Hon. Mr. McLeod introduced a bill in amendment to the probate act and stated that the chief object of the bill was to reduce the fees on stamps in petitions under the act.

Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill in amendment to the coroner's act, which he explained was made necessary by conditions during the construction through the province of the Transcontinental railway. It has particular reference to adjoining parishes in the counties of Carleton and York.

Hon. Mr. Landry asked for leave of absence for one week for Mr. Sheridan, because of illness, which was granted.

Mr. Hart presented the petition of the town council of St. Andrews in favor of the amendment to the probate act.

Fredericton, March 23.—Hon. Mr. Hazen, in reply to Mr. Uppham's enquiry as to whether the government was aware that an inmate of the county jail, of Carleton county, was allowed to leave the jail and work on the farm of the county of Carleton.

Hon. Mr. Fleming, in reply to Mr. Tweeddale's question, "Has Mr. T. J. Carter, of Andover, submitted a claim to the government for services in connection with liquor prosecutions in Victoria county rendered previous to March 1908?"

Q.—If so what is the amount of each claim? When were the services performed? Who authorized such prosecution, and what action has the government taken on the claim?

A.—The claim is for the prosecution of two cases in the supreme court, one between John W. Niles and Collingwood Rogers, and the other between Charles Rogers and Samuel Lewis and James Rogers. The claim is for the prosecution of the cases, the costs as taxed by the court.

The two cases were tried at Carleton county, and the costs as taxed by the court were in the two cases \$387.50 and \$237.50 respectively. The services were performed in the year 1907. The prosecution was undertaken at the instance of a large number of the leading citizens of the village of Perth.

The government has the claim under consideration.

Q.—Has the claim been performed in the said parish of Carleton and what amount of money was expended on the public roads in the parish of Carleton under the supervision of the said James Smith prior to said 31st day of October last paid for before said date?

A.—\$2,423.66.

Q.—Was all work performed under the supervision of the said James Smith prior to said 31st day of October last paid for before said date?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Has there been any work performed in said district since the said 31st day of October last, and what amount of money was expended on the public roads in the parish of Carleton under the supervision of the said James Smith prior to said 31st day of October last paid for before said date?

A.—The sum of \$772.22 is the total amount paid for the work done since October 31, 1908, and out of this sum \$460.40 was paid Supt. James Smith for work performed in July, August, September and October, 1908.

Q.—Who are the road superintendents in the said parish of Carleton and what amount of money was expended on the public roads in the parish of Carleton under the supervision of the said James Smith prior to said 31st day of October last paid for before said date?

A.—Winslow Milner and James Smith. Ten per cent commission on the amounts announced as the remuneration allowed.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey, in reply to Mr. LaBilloy's question, "Has the chief commissioner of public works taken occasion to visit the location of the Metapedia inter-provincial bridge during recent?"

A.—Yes.

Q.—If so, did the provincial engineer accompany the chief commissioner and who it was present during the examination of the site?

A.—The chief engineer did not accompany the chief commissioner. There were several men working at the site putting the bridge in shape.

Q.—Has the commissioner made any report to the government-in-council in the matter? If so what decision has been arrived at?

A.—The chief commissioner made a report to the government-in-council recommending a grant. The government has decided to make a grant of \$5,000 for a bridge also to make a road on the New Brunswick end of the bridge.

## THE HARBOR PROPERTY

## City Wharf Properties are Valued at \$3,000,000 in Estimate Sent to Ottawa.

A report prepared by S. A. Corbett, accountant, Adam Macintyre, comptroller, and William Murdoch, city engineer, and submitted to the harbor facilities committee yesterday afternoon placed an estimated value of about \$3,000,000 on the wharf properties owned by the city. Private wharves, fisheries and other property must be calculated before the total value of the harbor property is ascertained, and it was decided to forward to Hon. William Pugsley a detailed statement of the information already secured, so that the minister of public works might have the uses at his disposal as soon as possible. A plan of the harbor showing the location of the wharves will also be sent to Ottawa.

In the valuation of about \$3,000,000, the improvements on the west side are figured at about \$1,270,000. Being of recent date, little difficulty was experienced in arriving at the city's expenditures on these wharves. The valuation of the older wharves on a basis of expenditure gave considerable trouble. It was found that payments in the past had been made out of revenue and out of the assessment and in some instances it was impossible to obtain accurate figures as to the first cost. In these cases the city engineer had several valuations taken, and appraised the valuation from this data.

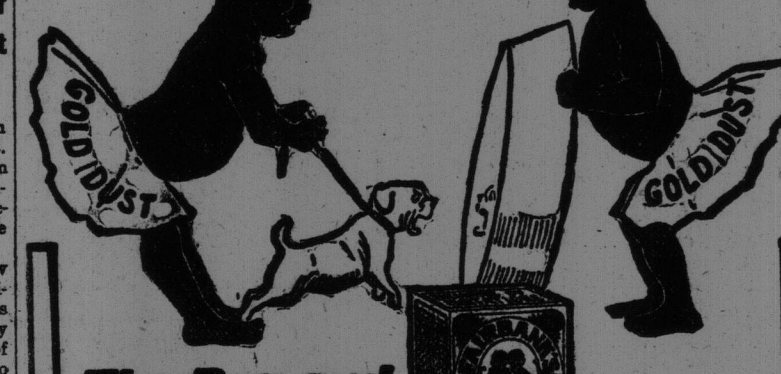
