WITH THE LOCAL SOLDIERS
It is notified for the information of all concerned that in view of the numerous requests being received from citizens relatives who are under the age of twenty-one, and who have enlisted in overseas units, it has been decided that no man giving place of birth or address of next of kin as being in the United States are to be enlisted unless they are of the age of twenty-one.

The following transfers were in orders to day to the 115th Battalion, C. E. F.: Private H. C. Williamson to the 165th Battalion, Sergeant A. E. Roy.

The amendments to the instructions governing organization and administration, C. E. F. units contain a regulation concerning the subsistence of officers and N. C. O.'s at schools, in the future, to prevent double payment and no-payment of allowances for subsistence. It is to be distinctly understood by all concerned that immediately an officer, N. C. O., or man of a C. E. F. unit leaves his unit to take a course at school or with another unit, he is struck off rations or subsistence. The officer in charge of a school or course will have as many officers, N. C. O.'s or men as possible placed in messes and placed on rations. For those officers, etc., who cannot be placed in quarters and messes, he will obtain authority from the A. A. G. through the paymaster for subsistence allowance to be authorized the rate of pay as follows: Officers not supplied with rations or quarters, \$1.50; officers supplied with rations, but not with quarters, 75c. a day; C. O.'s and men not supplied with

Here are the names: Dominick LeBlanc, aged 81 years; his wife, Rose; Richard, his wife, aged 58; their son, Joseph LeBlanc, 54 years, and Euphemia Leger, his wife, aged 59; Thomas LeBlanc, son of the latter, aged 36, and Mrs. Zelman LeBlanc, his wife, aged 38; and the three children of the latter, Anita, aged 8 years, Hortia, 3 years and Aylene, 1 year. The combined ages of all the members of this wonderful family amount to 229 years.

REALIZED \$60
A pile social in aid of the fund for supplying food and comforts to Canadian prisoners of war in Germany took place in Quispamsis school on last Monday. Miss Muriel Robertson of the Red Cross Society kindly opened the proceedings by telling the audience something of the aims and methods of this branch of Red Cross work, and a letter received by Mrs. Hutchings from the "adopted" prisoner at Gettsen. In spite of the wet evening, a very considerable gathering of people. Many friends sent gifts of ice cream and candy, and the sale of these, along with the proceeds of the refreshments, amounted to \$60.

UPSET WITH AUTO
Recently a bride and groom here from New York on their honeymoon, decided to see the beauties of the coast and the perfect way they started to visit some friends in Black River which is some twenty miles from the city. In the evening, after a delightful day, they started for town, but when turning from a driveway leading from the main road to the house where they were staying, the rear wheel of the auto caught on the side of a steep bank and the car turned almost over. The occupants were thrown forcibly out of the car and the ground and the chauffeur was pinned under the auto. After considerable difficulty he was removed, apparently none the worse for his mishap. The car was eventually placed on the road again and the party proceeded to the city, thankful that they had escaped serious injury.

EDWIN MONTAGU MAY BE THE NEW BRITISH MUNITIONS MINISTER

London, July 6—A reorganization of the cabinet will be necessary when the announcement is made tomorrow or Saturday that Lloyd George's promotion to the war office. Edwin Montagu financial secretary of the treasury, is expected to succeed as minister of munitions.

The Morning Telegraph believes that J. Austin Chamberlain will retire as secretary for India in order that a member of the House of Lords may be appointed to fill the cabinet vacancy in the upper house caused by the death of Lord Kitchener. In this case Mr. Chamberlain would receive another office of equal importance to that which he now holds.

Another way of meeting the vacancy in the upper house would be the elevation of Sir Edward Grey to the peerage. According to some of the morning papers, it is proposed to create Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary secretary for war, a peer, and have him succeed Mr. Montagu as chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster a post which he holds in addition to his secretaryship.

London, July 6—It is understood that the report that Sir Edward Grey, foreign secretary, is to be raised to the peerage is correct and that as a fact he already has accepted such an offer. A Barony of the United Kingdom probably will be conferred on him soon.

MONEY ORDERS ARE FOUND IN SCOW

Three money orders for \$10, \$25 and \$50, were found by two men working in a scow off Portland street, this morning. The matter was reported to the North End police station and Policeman Hannan went to the scow and secured the orders. They were brought to headquarters. Later they were taken by the Dominion Express Company and a receipt was given the authorities at central station. How the money orders got on the scow was not learned. None of the workmen reported losing them. A letter addressed to a firm in Fredericton was also found and will be forwarded.
