A letter recently received in Moncton states that somewhere in France within a month past, Captain Frank Thingley, son of A. J. Thingley, of Moncton, happened to make a call upon Lieut.-Col. Anderson, also of Moncton. The latter was in his tent used as an office, attending to official business, when Captain Thingley called. During the conversation an orderly dropped in and made a communication to Col. Anderson. The latter turned around and said to Captain Frank Thingley: "There's an old fashioned English custom of having tea about this time of the day. Suppose we go and have some." They left the tent and went out to a place where tea was being served for them. They had scarcely sat down at the table when they heard the noise of an explosion and ran back to the tent, from whence the sound came. A shell thrown by a German battery had fallen into the tent, broken into pieces the table, at which they had been sitting and killed the orderly left there, who was sitting at a clerk.

## LIFTING OF CENSORSHIP

POPULAR IN ENGLAND

British Public Grateful for Detailed News Allowed to Come from the Front.

London, July 25.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—By lifting the ban on news from the front, the British public to get a clearer view of what is going on at the front, the war office has made a popular move. This revolution in departmental methods has been conducted in secret and it is its effect on the people has been magical.

The British are being fed generously on what they were deprived of for nearly two years, namely, personal details of the soldiers. And they like it. It is about the most revolutionary occurrence since the war began.

The people realize that there is still much that must be hidden, but they are very grateful for the concessions made. They realize that this war must be large-scale, and that it is not only a matter of the front, but of the whole world as Rome once was.

The deeds of particular regiments or divisions, but in other respects the veil has been lifted and the British public has been permitted to see many moving stories which present the war to those who stay at home in a true light than ever before.
