IF YOU LIKE GOLF AND HAVE \$1,000 TO SPARE PERHAPS YOU MAY GET IN

Fairfield, Conn., March 25.—To enable the Fairfield Country Club to charge \$1000 entrance fee, a bill has been favorably reported to the state legislature by the committee on incorporation. And it is intended to have dues in proportion to the entrance fees. Yet the promoters of a hearing in Hartford denied that it was to be an exclusive club for the benefit of millionaires. Winthrop H. Perry, who represented

the club, said that it was to be a public benefactor. He said that the wealthy New York and local residents of Fairfield, with a penchant for golf, had a plan to make Fairfield the garden spot of New England, and it would make the rest of the United States jealous. The promoters of the club have leased from the town of Fairfield 2,500 feet of shore property facing Long Island Sound, the lease to run 200 years, on condition that 1,000 feet be thrown open as a public park and the other 600 feet be used for club purposes. Already the club members have expended \$50,000 in filling one hole on the property, which is a picturesque combination of high and low land. The members expect to expend about \$200,000 more in fitting out the grounds. They are not land promoters and do not expect to benefit personally, according to Attorney Perry.

WHY NOAH BRUSSO BECAME TOMMY BURNS OF FAME IN THE RING

Why Noah Brusso changed his name to "Tommy Burns" under which he won ring fame is told by himself in the Boston Globe as follows: "I belonged to the Detroit Athletic Club when I started my career as a boxer, and of course, as you know, there are always a few people belonging to such a club who would be glad to see you beaten, especially if you are successful. They bought a big middleweight by the name of Big O'Grady, and I was a 2 to 1 favorite when we stepped into the ring. "The contest lasted only three rounds, as O'Grady was knocked out. They took him to the hospital and he was there 12 days. Of course all the boys and second knockouts connected with the affair were arrested, and of course my people, hearing about this, said it was terrible and wanted me to quit boxing. So after O'Grady got out of the hospital I left Detroit and went to Chicago and changed my name to Tommy Burns. I was there for about two weeks and I matched myself against a chap by the name of George Shosbree, and I also matched myself the following night with Mike Schreck in Milwaukee. "So I had two fights in two days in succession. I knocked Shosbree out in five rounds and on the following night, in Milwaukee, Schreck was a 3 to 1 favorite over me. Nobody seemed to give me a look-up, as they didn't seem to know anything about me. After knocking Schreck down four times in the six rounds, the referee, A. Pollock, who was Schreck's manager's pal, gave me a draw, but that draw decision was given that night, although I saw an article about a week ago, in one of the American papers, where Schreck had beaten me twice. "Of course, after that contest with Shosbree my stock went up. I then went out to the coast and fought Billy Woods who fought Walcott a draw, and I fought Hugo Kelly, O'Brien, Sullivan, Jim Flynn, etc. "I suppose you know my career from then on as well as I do. "I am in the clothing business in Calgary, as you will see by the letterhead. After losing my contest to Johnson in Australia I came to this country and opened business. I have been here four

GALLET'S VICTORY



Young Gallet, local lightweight, returned this morning from Amherst after administering a severe defeat to "Kid" Burns, the lightweight champion of the West Indies. Gallet says he weighed in at 120½ pounds and his colored opponent at 180 pounds. Editors are being made to arrange a "chum" match in two or three weeks time. The preliminaries included a five-round bout between L. Harte and F. Jones of the 2nd Battalion and a wrestling match between V. Lonsager and A. Petit of the same battalion. Regarding the main bout the Amherst News says:—

The first two rounds were about even. Burns gaining that much by a long swing to the kidneys at the end of the first round. Gallet came back with a few short arm jabs to the face and neck, and Burns gradually commenced to wear his man down, yet could not bring across a sleep producer. The dark complexioned lad was clever, and with a month or so of training could put up some scrap. Leaving that alone, he gave Gallet his share of enlightening until the eighth round, when he changed his style and hung back, depending on his left and extensive reach. This change apparently puzzled Gallet until the eighth round, when he swung a right hook to the jaw, with a jab to the body, which set Burns dizzy. A lengthy clinch followed, and Referee McLeod found it necessary to do the crowd bar act. The final round was comparatively slow. Gallet doing all the leading, but not following up his blows. With the call of the time, McLeod announced Gallet to be the winner.

The officials were more than competent. Never before had spectators been so quiet at a boxing match, and this fact is due to the warning issued by Sergeant West and Sergeant MacCall, who acted as time-keeper. Referee Beth McLeod, former welter weight champion of Canada and now with the 6th Mounted Rifles, had his men well in hand.

Katie Lemle Defeated
Charles Cutler, champion of the American heavyweight wrestling title, defeated Katie Lemle, Bohemian "perfect man," in two straight falls in the feature bout of the wrestling carnival in Boston on Wednesday night. The Chicago grappler secured the first fall in 1 hour, 10 minutes, 10 seconds by means of an arm roll and head scissors hold, and followed up with a second fall in the time of 9 minutes, 40 seconds. The contest was easily one of the hardest fought this year, and it was witnessed by more than 3,000 spectators. From the call of time both the grapplers were right after each other. 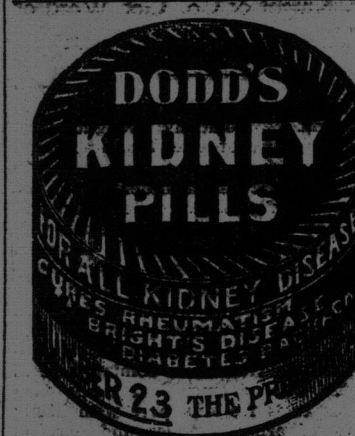
