GENERAL RAISE IN WAGE SCALE FOR RAILROADS

Official Statement on Strike
Settlement Made by
Presidents

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—"The increase granted to the conductors and trainmen will inevitably force the railways to take up the question of adjustment of rates of pay in other classes, many of whom have already brought their demands before the management," E. W. Beatty, president of the C. P. R., and Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R., said last evening, following the announcement that a compromise had been reached with representatives of the Order of Railway Conductors and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

All possibility of a strike has been averted, although the railway officials point out that the operating cost of the railways will be increased owing to the large number of men affected by the increases.

King To Give Coal To Poor At Christmas

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Christmas gifts of coal will be added to the usual remembrances given by King George to many of his neighbors at Windsor. Scarcity of fuel throughout England caused the announcement, issued at Buckingham Palace today, to the effect that all poor persons who had passed 60 years and who had lived 12 months or longer at Windsor would receive this additional gift.

Capt. J. Marquand
NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Dec. 3.—Captain James Marquand, 90, New Bedford's oldest whaling master, is dead, following a month's illness. He went to sea at the age of ten, was mate of a vessel at 14, and followed his calling for 46 years. Born in Pictou, N. S., Nov. 6, 1836, he came to the States as a boy, locating in Fall River. He was boatsteerer aboard the Volvation for a 42-months' cruise to New Zealand and brought back a cargo of oil. Another cruise aboard the bark Coral was for 40 months.

Aged Tracadie Man Seriously Injured


ANTIGONISH, N. S., Dec. 4.—No hope is held for the recovery of Hubert Cann Delorey, of Tracadie, Antigonish county, who lies in hospital here suffering from a fractured skull and other injuries received when he was struck yesterday morning by an automobile driven by Leslie Parks, a commercial




